

Trading of peanuts grown in the Southeast was fairly slow and demand was moderate for old crop. Prices were higher for U.S. Splits but were about unchanged for others. Trading on new crop peanuts was limited to runner splits as most shellers and users were reluctant to commit themselves at this time.
