Lost Colony Choir To Perform In Concert

The Lost Colony Choir will sing in a special memorial concert at beautiful Waterside Theatre in Manteo on Sunday at 7 P.M.

Lost Colony music director and composer, Rosalind MacEnulty, will direct the choir as they perform the classic spiritual composition, "Requiem" by Gabriel Faure. The outdoor stage of the famed outdoor

drama was chosen as an appropriate setting for the presentation which is a memorial to four deceased members of the cast.

The 45-minute performance will be dedicated to the memory of Don Sommers, who performed as "Old Tom" for six seasons beginning in 1938; Barbara Edwards St. Clair, who will be remembered for her outstanding portrayal of

Eleanor Dare from 1948-1953; Carlyle Dukes who played the lead role of John Borden in 1975 and 1976; and Rick Spencer, a young actor cast as Ananias Dare in The Lost Colony, in 1976 and 1977.

Mrs. MacEnulty, who composed the music for the first act of The Lost Colony, received critical acclaim for her original choral work "An American Requiem"

that was televised statewide in North Carolina last summer on PBS.

The work by Faure is a lyrical melodic composition in the French romantic style. A musician and composer in France at the turn of the century, Gabriel Faure is known for his religious music as well as a large body of French art songs.

CANKER SORES

The canker sore (or aphthous ulcer) is one of the best known and most persistently annoying dental lesions. It is small and whitish and may occur on the gums, cheeks or tongue. It appears singly and in clusters. A blister usually forms first, without notice, then breaks to form an open sore or canker. Then the acute pain begins.

The open canker sore is especially sensitive to touch and to hot or spicy foods. Fortunately, the lifetime of the canker sore normally runs its course in about a week or ten days.

No good treatment is known for its cure at present. There's not much you can do except to make sure you avoid irritating foods. Some people are especially prone to canker sores. They seem to run in families and there may be a connection between canker attacks and emotional stress, though there is still no definite information on the cause of this puzzling disorder.

A dentist can treat canker sores to relieve the pain. However, certain kinds of cankers tend to persist or come back in spite of any treatment now known.
