A partial denture is a removable appliance that substitutes for one or several missing natural teeth. It is held in place by clasps that grip the natural teeth adjacent to the partial.

Good oral hygiene habits are particularly important for wearers of partial dentures. If food residue and film are allowed to accumulate on clasps the important abutment teeth may decay. Therefore, partials should be cleaned after each meal and special attention should be given to cleaning the inside of the clasps. While you're at it, clean your regular teeth to remove any food debris that could accumulate under the cover afforded by the partial denture.

If a partial denture, breaks or becomes damaged in any way, it should be taken at once to the dentist for repair. Attempts to wear damaged appliance can be dangerous. A shift of a fraction of a millimeter in the form of the partial can cause destructive forces on several teeth. Also, an improper amateur adjustment could possibly render the partial completely useless and irreparable by anyone.
