Goodwin New Roanoke Rapids Coach

The Roanoke Rapids Board of Education has employed a Tyner native as physical education instructor and coach for the girls' basketball and softball teams at Roanoke Rapids High School.

Carleen Paige Goodwin assumed her position on August 19, according to Supt. Robert Clary. Clary commented, "In our evaluation process, we have 30 qualities" which are considered. He said Miss Goodwin "was rated above average or superior by every one of her references."

Margaret Lewis, principal at Johnson School in Rocky Mount, said the coach "exemplifies those qualities which characterize an outstanding teacher." John R. McCarthy, athletic director at N. C. Wesleyan

"recommended without reservation" Miss Goodwin to the school board.

Clary said he was impressed by her "coaching philosophy" which is to develop character in the players. He quoted from her written statement, "Winning is the objective but my players have won if they have developed respect for their school, their opponents, for me, and most of all respect for themselves."

Since 1978, Miss Goodwin has been a physical education instructor in the Rocky Mount City Schools. She coached girls Eighth Grade basketball to a "perfect season" at Edwards Junior High School and coached Ninth Grade girls' softball at the same school. From 1975 to 1978, she was physical education instructor at OLPH Catholic

School, also in Rocky Mount. For the years 1978, 1979, and 1980, she served as assistant softball, volleyball and basketball coach, respectively, at Wesleyan.

A graduate of Chowan High School in Tyner, Miss Goodwin received a BS degree in physical education

at N. C. Wesleyan College in 1978. She was a member of the varsity basketball team for four years in high school and for four years at Wesleyan, serving during that period as a team co-captain.

As a member of the Wesleyan varsity softball

team from 1974-1977, she also served as a co-captain.

In 1975, she was the first recipient of Wesleyan's Most Outstanding Female Athlete Award.

Miss Goodwin, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carlton Goodwin of Tyner.

Mitzke Gets Promotion

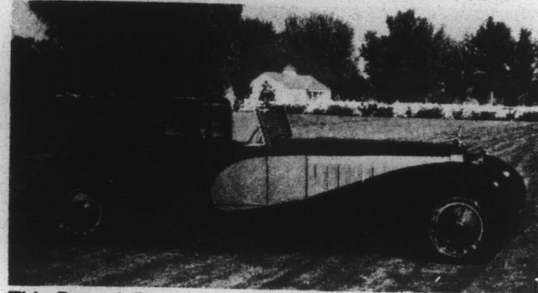

Hospital Begins Expansion Project

Chowan Hospital, Inc., filed notice on Sept. 14 of intent to incur a capital expenditure for the relocation of four intensive care beds from the first floor to a projected location on the second floor. The project is scheduled for completion in August, 1983, and is estimated to cost \$374,389.

This project is part of an overall expansion of the hospital which includes the addition of 10 beds and ancillary facilities.

The project proposal has been submitted to the Certificate of Need Section, Division of Facility Ser-

vices, N. C. Department of Human Resources, for review by planning agencies.

The planning agencies, in examining the proposal, will seek to determine whether the project is needed, if it
