GETTING USED TO BIFOCALS

If you can move your eyes, you won't have any problem getting used to bifocals. The eyeglasses have to be properly fitted so they are centered in front of your eyes. The rest is up to you. Your eyes will move up to use the vision correction in the upper part of the lens. That's for looking at objects beyond your reading distance, depending on your vision problem. Your eyes move down naturally when you're reading to make use of the lower part of the lens. Walking up or down stairs may be a problem at first. You have to look down to see where you're going. You may find it easier to use the upper part of your lens. All you have to do is bend your chin down a bit. The same goes when you're stepping off a curb. It just takes a little practice. Bifocals are convenient to use. You don't have to change glasses for different kinds of viewing. But if you'd rather have two sets of glasses, you have that option, too.
