
Cane Drive Now Underway

The state Association was organized by the N. C. Lions in 1934 as a non-profit, statewide organization and is supported by Lions through this one annual fund raising project, The White Cane Drive.

The association renders service to any blind and visually impaired person if there is a need and there are other resources no available. Funds raised will be used to prevent unnecessary blindness in North Carolina and for restoring the sight of those who have been categorized as blind. Besides helping those with impaired vision or loss of eyesights, the Association contributes to the benefit of everyone through its cooperation with research efforts to control the disabling eye disease --
