What even puzzles me more is the fact that the Medicaid Investigations Unit of the state Attorney General's Office, Raleigh, N.C., chose to make a press release of the matter with only a minimum amount of actual facts submitted. I am

aware of the various restraints governing that office and understand the legal reading of the indictments, but it appears the matter could have been given more justice.

Annual Dinner Is Planned

The Free Will Baptist churches in Washington, Tyrrell, Martin, Pasquotank, and Chowan counties will hold their annual dinner in support of Mount Olive College tonight (Thursday), at 7:30 P. M. at Washington County Union School in Roper.

David Cahoon, chairman, announced that the goal for the 13 churches is \$5,475.

The local dinner is one of 17 being held throughout eastern North Carolina during October and November with a combined goal of \$156,000. Since the dinners were begun in 1963, they have provided more than \$1.3-million in gift support for the college.

"Through these dinners

we want to provide friends, alumni and members of the Free Will Baptist Church an opportunity to invest in the work of Mount Olive College," declared President W. Bruckette Raper. "These dinners will help provide the support we need to develop Mount Olive into a four-year institution."

At the annual fund raising event, the college will present three \$100 scholarships: one to the church bringing the largest contribution; one to the church giving the greatest amount of money per capita; and one to the church with the largest number of high school students present.
