"INVISIBLE" BIFOCALS

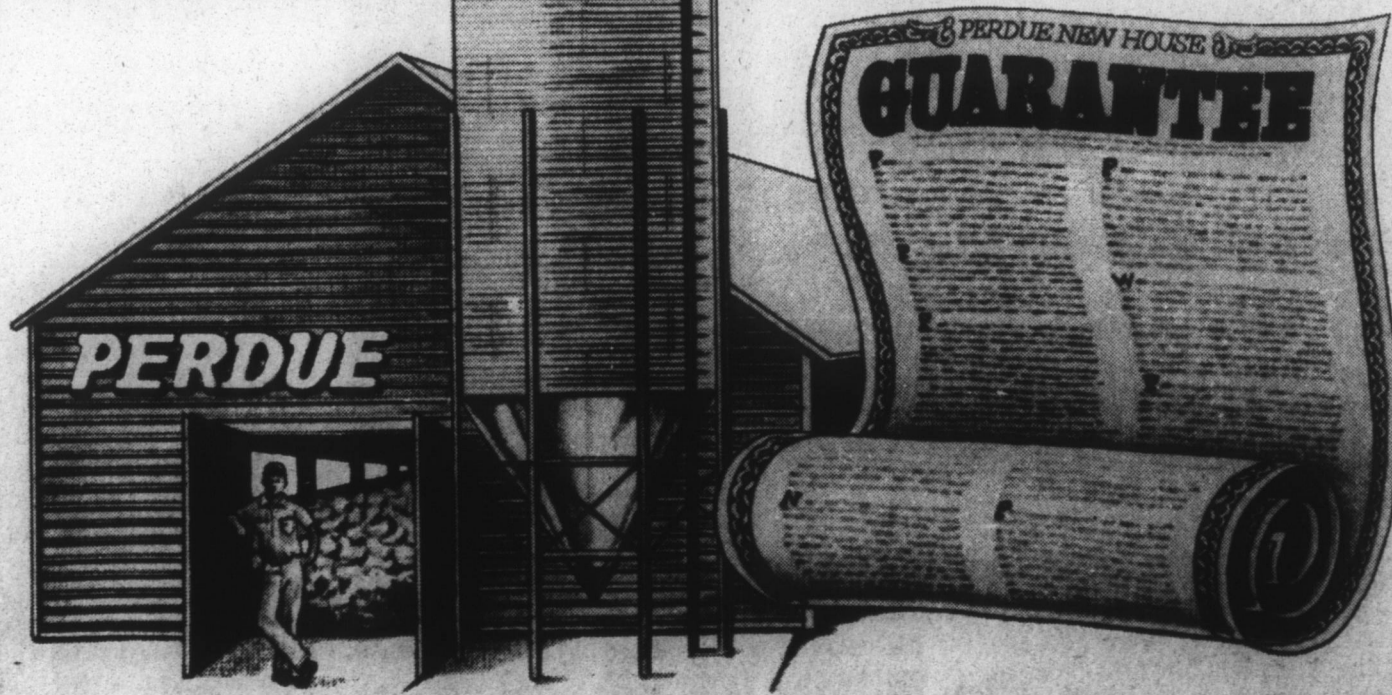
