Mrs. Boston successfully passed the National Board Examination of The Conference of Funeral Service

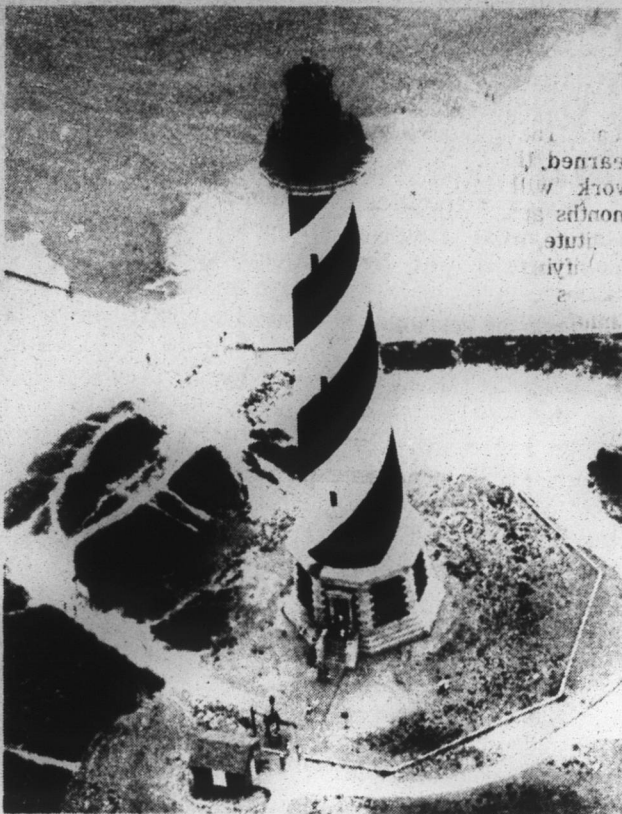

CAPE HATTERAS LIGHTHOUSE ENDANGERED — Seas once half a mile from Cape Hatteras Lighthouse on the North Carolina coast are today less than 100 feet from its foundations, prompting Governor James Hunt and U. S. Senator Jesse Helms to call a meeting in Raleigh, September 8 to organize a drive for funds to save the famous landmark. It is believed that a successful volunteer drive to raise as much as \$1-million will demonstrate to Congress that North Carolinians want the historic structure that is the tallest lighthouse in the United States permanently protected. allow light to shine through. This will be attached to the old frame which has been sanded and painted white. Teacher for this class will be Fran Ward.

2. Net Weaving (cost approximately \$4-\$4.50) This is a pretty lacy open design in cream color. You will make a placemat. This may also be framed or made into a rectangular pillow if desired. Teacher for this class will be Gladys White.

3. 36" Hammock (cost approximately \$20) - Class members will tie a hammock from twisted spun polyester. Teacher for the class will be Hilda Goodwin.

4. Tatting (cost approximately \$2) - Students will learn basic tatting which can be used to make trims, etc. This is a very old needlecraft. Ima Asbell will be teaching this class.

5. Candlewicking (cost approximately \$5) - Students will make a pillow with a design of knots and running stitches on muslin. May have ruffle or corded binding. Sue Parrish will be teaching this class.

6. Square Baskets (cost approximately \$6.25) - Students will weave a small square basket with a hand-carved handle. Elsie Edwards will be the instructor for class.

Views On Dental Health

Topical Anesthesia

The principal objection patients have to local anesthesia is the sensation caused by the entry of the needle. If you have this fear, be open and frank with your dentist. Several techniques have been developed to eliminate this problem.

The needles used in most dental offices today are disposable. They come presterilized, are used only once, and are then disposed of. This means a smoother entry, since needles used more than once may roughen slightly on the edge and make penetration more irritating.

To protect the area being injected, dentist often use a topical anesthetic, frequently in

the form of benzocaine or lidocaine in a cream base. The solution is painted on at the point of injection and causes numbness that may help eliminate the sensation associated with the injection.

A recent innovation is the use of nitrous oxide and oxygen or "laughing gas" breathed before the anesthetic is given. This rapidly numbs the area and the anesthesia can then be obtained with little or no sensation whatsoever.

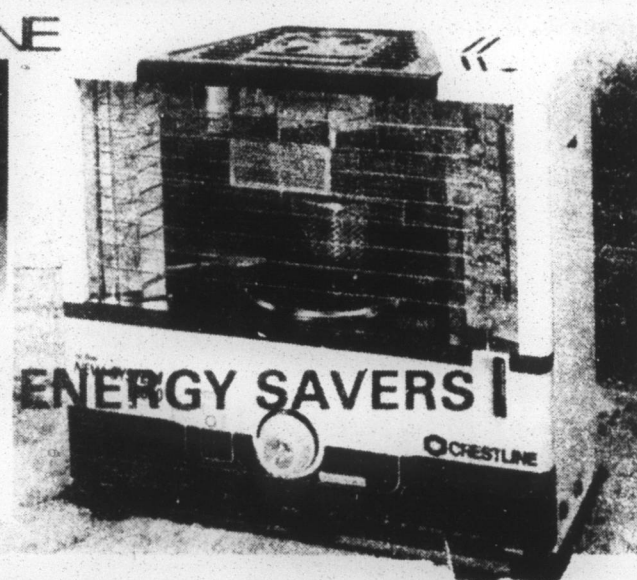
