The Sanctuary Building Committee will meet on Monday, January 18, 7:30 P.M., in the church library.

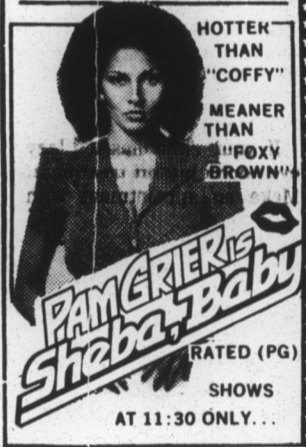

Which Toothbrush For You

Although we don't often think about what kind of toothbrush to buy, there are differences, and important ones. Toothbrushes must be prescribed for individual use just as medicines are.

Not long ago, the hard, natural bristle brush was almost universally recommended, and with some dentists it still is. However, the natural bristles have almost knife-like tips that can cut into the gums and even the tooth, and, when used to remove plaque under gums, can break and create irritation in the area. Consequently, more and more dentists are recommending the soft, multi-tufted nylon brushes with rounded bristles. These are ideal for plaque removal.

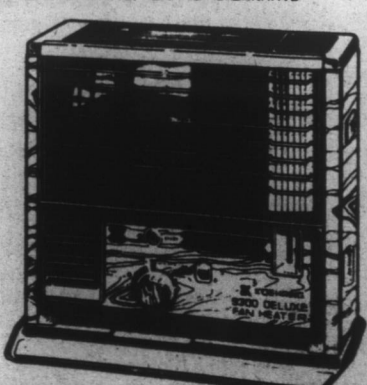
These bristles won't break under or irritate the gums. When properly used, the many bristles loosen the plaque and scrub it away. In general, and only in general, the stright handles are better than one with a curved or angled handle and the kind with tufts shaped into waves or bumps are not required unless you have wavy or bumpy teeth.
