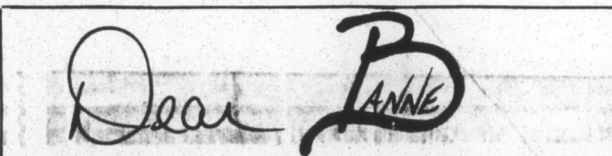
Miss Wright To Marry

Contacts and Cataracts

Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could be sweet sixteen for life. Unfortunately as age rolls on, our bodies (including our gums) do change. What this means to the denture-wearer is that - no matter how perfect your dentures fit when you walk out of the office - eventually, they will have to be adjusted to harmonize with the changes in the gums and bony ridges which provide its support.

It's not hard to determine that a denture no longer fits properly. It feels loose, moves when it shouldn't, is uncomfortable and may interfere with speaking and eating ability. This is the time for action. Poorly-fitting dentures can harm your mouth. Constant irritation over a long period of time can

contribute to the development of sores or tumors. This is also not the time to adjust or repair them yourself. Improper home repair can cause serious harm. See your dentist for any problems with your denture. Normally an adjustment for irritation or a relining of looseness may be the answer to your discomfort. Let's face it, we all change and our gums are no exception. If you're looking for someone to blame, try Mother Nature.

Rural Heart Fund Week Set

The week of Feb. 22 has been designated Rural Heart Week, according to Fran Ward, Rural Heart Fund Director of Chowan County. "Our goal is to reach every home in our rural areas to leave educational material and to receive donations to the 1982 Heart Fund," she said.

"Because of the distance that many people outside of town must travel to get to a hospital, it is important that they know the warning signs of a possible heart attack and act immediately to help the victim," Mrs. Ward continued. "This means calling an emergency squad for transportation or driving

the person to the hospital." She listed the following signs of heart attack: -Prolonged heavy pressure or squeezing pain in the center of the chest behind the breastbone; -Pain spreading to the shoulder, arm, neck, or jaw; -Pain or discomfort followed by sweating, nausea, vomiting, or shortness of breath. "These symptoms may subside and then return, but don't wait. Get the person to a hospital emergency room at once," she said.

Public education on heart attack, stroke, high blood pressure, and other forms of heart disease is one of the

programs supported by the Heart Fund Mrs. Ward pointed out. Other programs cover research, professional education and training, and community service. All Heart Fund contributions are tax-deductible.

Body Language & Dentures

A cataract is a clouding of the lens of the eye. When vision is seriously impaired, the lens is removed by surgery. Glasses or contact lenses are used to compensate for this. Otherwise you would suffer from extreme farsightedness.

Before the advent of contact lenses, the only alternative was to wear thick-lensed glasses to correct vision after cataract surgery. These magnified the eyes so much that it made people who wore them uncomfortable about their appearance.

There was also a problem in the glasses themselves, because of the space between the lens and the eyes. It tended to distort the actual size of things seen. This was especially true in cases where only one eye had been affected by cataract.

Now we have contact lenses, with both soft and hard lenses, that fit directly over the eyes, improving vision and appearance.

Now there is a choice. You can still wear glasses, if that's your preference. Or you can choose contacts and enjoy their advantages.
