The grain dealer's license of James L. Ownley, operator of Towe-Pike Grain and Supply Company, Route 2, Hertford, was revoked after failure to replace his dealer's bond following notification that it would be canceled by Nationwide Insurance Company on October 17.

Following a review of the evidence entered in the hearing, state Agriculture Commissioner James A. Graham signed the order rescinding Ownley's license effective February 9.

To Inform All Edenton Citizens

The Following Letter Was Presented For Council's Consideration By Interested Edenton Citizens

February 12, 1982

Gentlemen:

Please allow us the opportunity of voicing our opinion relative to the action taken by the Town Council on Tuesday past. While we appreciate the effort, energy, and dedication shown by you and the Council in managing the VEPCO refund, we request that you reconsider your action.

The undersigned are aware that our municipal sewage system is in serious need of major repair and improvement. This need was made more vivid yesterday when a group of Edenton citizens went to Raleigh and were denied the privilege of adding a new rest home business to the Edenton sewer system. The condition of our Edenton sewer system in simply equates to the fact that the State Commerce Department in Raleigh can not recommend or send any new industries to Edenton. Certainly all of us are feeling the severe effects of unemployment, and therefore, new industry is more desperately needed than ever before. With this concern and our grave need for improved living conditions for all of Edenton's citizens, we ask that the Council rescind the action to distribute \$50.00 to residential customers and consider one of the following actions:

A. That VEPCO refund monies be invested in interest bearing notes until such time as plans can be made to implement the necessary improvements and extensions to our sewer system in a manner that will create better living conditions in our community as well as creating the much needed attraction of new business and new employment opportunities to Edenton. Upon completion of said plans, that the VEPCO refund monies be used to construct or assist in construction of the sewer improvements.

B. In the event that Council does not approve action A, we would then request that you and Council distribute all or whatever portion you deem appropriate of the VEPCO refund monies in an equitable and proportionate distribution to all Edenton utility users based as much as possible on their rate of usage.

The Following Reasons Were Presented In Support Of The Propositions...

Proposition A...

1. Refund from VEPCO to the Town of Edenton was for WHOLESALE charge only, which was NOT passed on to the retail customer to any appreciable amount.
2. The North Carolina Division of Environmental Management has instructed that Edenton can not place any additional requirements on the present overloaded sewer system. What that means is that there can be ...
 - a. NO NEW HOMES
 - b. NO NEW BUSINESSES
 - c. NO NEW INDUSTRY
 - d. NO EXPANSIONS TO ANY OF THE ABOVE.
3. No new industrial employment opportunities able to locate in Edenton.
4. Lower future tax requirements for sewer system improvements if all funds retained.

Proposition B...

1. Industrial and commercial customers account for approximately the same amount of usage as residential customers and the commercial customers are paying a higher rate.
2. Calculation of equitable distribution would not incur an unreasonable cost to the town.
3. Commercial and industrial users provide the bulk of the jobs for all our citizens.
