New Courses Taught This Spring

What do a busy college president and a mathematician have in common? This spring, at College of The Albemarle, each scholar will be teaching a course not usually found in the quarterly class schedule.

COA President Dr. J. Parker Chesson, Jr., who came to the college 18 years ago to teach biology, will return to the classroom at 7 P.M. each Monday to teach "Topics in Biology". The three credit-hour course begins on March 8.

Dr. Chesson, who is chairman of the N. C. Coastal Resources Commission, will discuss a number of environmental and ecological concerns. They include coastal ecology, the geology and ecology of the Dismal Swamp, and environment and politics. Other topics will observe the role of science in society, as well as a close look at the ethics involved with DNA experiments in the bio-engineering field.

Julian Aydtlett, algebra, trigonometry, and calculus instructor at COA, will turn to stargazing each Tuesday and Thursday night this spring. What began as a hobby some years ago, for the mathematician has emerged as a four credit-hour course, Introductory Astronomy. He will indoctrinate students to the celestial bodies, their magnitudes, motion and constitution.

Registration for evening students will remain open until March 12, according to Jimmy Anderson, evening programs director. Persons interested in enrolling should visit the Admissions Office in Room A-122 at the COA campus, Monday through Thursday from 8 A.M. until 10 P.M., and on Friday from 8 A.M. until 3:30 P.M. said Anderson.

Reaganomics

"Most of the signs of Reaganomics are easy to spot--the long-term unemployed whose compensation ends, the student whose father died in Vietnam learning that he won't get educational funds--but some effects are more subtle, if equally severe."

This was the comment today by N. C. Democratic Party Chairman Russell Walker of Randolph County. He said: "A good example of such indirect penalties is the fact that people who pay hospital bills--either through insurance or out of their own pocket--are seeing those bills rise sharply because of Administration cuts in Medicare and Medicaid."

Sen. Walker cited the statement of Thomas A. Rose, president of Blue Cross and Blue Shield in North Carolina, who told a civic club that "as of January 20, twenty-two North Carolina hospitals had implemented rate increases amounting to \$16-million additional gross revenue because of federal Medicaid reductions."

Because North Carolina hospitals get up to 27 per cent fewer dollars from government-insured patients than from private patients, the Blue Cross president said, people with private health-care plans in effect paid \$124-million to subsidize Medicare and Medicaid in North Carolina during 1981. He said the trend will increase in 1982 as the Administration's cuts continue.

Sen. Walker said: "This is one place that Reaganomics hits the middle income group, that tries to keep its bills paid, right in the family budget. This will lead to higher direct costs for people using hospital and medical services and to higher hospital insurance cost whether or not they enjoy good health."
