Young people planning to Social Security work this summer for the first time need to take one step now to get a job; they need to apply for a Social Security number if they don't already have one.

It takes time to get a Social Security number, and it may take a lot longer to land a job in today's tight market. Many employers will not hire a person without a Social Security number.

So a person who delays applying may be seriously handicapped in the job

Tighter security, both in applications for the Social Security number and in its use for employment, has developed in recent years.

Employers usually insist that a card be shown rather than a Social Security number be given from memory Thus, they avoid the risk

of a wrong number and the resulting paperwork and inconvenience that may

Eligibility for and amount of retirement, survivors, 78. and disability benefits are 181 based on the earnings credited to a person's Social nie Security record.

People must provide documentary evidence of age, identity, and citizenship to get a Social Security number for the first time.

People age 18 or over must apply for the number in person.
