DEC Has New Project The Developmental Evaluation Center in Elizabeth City has undertaken a very worthwhile project for children who

have learning disabilities, in a five-county area of Northeastern North Carolina. The counties involved in-

clude Currituck, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Camden, and Chowan. Mostly preschoolers. these children are socially deprived children who seldom are exposed to toys or books that stimulate learning. Some of these children have never held a pencil in their hand or had a book or toy of their very own. Some have never had a story read to them.

These children play with toys at the Developmental **Evaluation** Center while they wait for services and then return to homes where stimulating toys are not accessible to them for various reasons.

Children who are tested and found to be delayed in meeting the milestones of psychomotor skills can benefit if DEC toys has toys new, something for everyone to send home with the child. A health professional will select the toy that best meets the child's particular need.




