## Bass Earns His Medical Degree

GREENVILLE — The East Caroling University School of Medicine graduated 36 physicians last week, the second class of students to receive their medical education at the state's newest medical school.

All of the students are from North Carolina. Six members of the class are women, and three are minorities. Among the graduates was William Thomas Bass of Edenton. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Bass, Route 3.

In July the new physicians will begin residency training in 11 specialties at 25 hospitals across the country. More than half the class selected primary care disciplines for postgraduate training and future medical practice. Dr. Bass will intern in pediatrics at Pitt Memorial Hospital here and will remain in Greenville for three to five years of study.

The students were honored at the medical school convocation ceremony May 7 and received their diplomas during ECU commencement exercises May 8. Last year medical degrees were awarded to the 28 students in the charter class at the medical school. This fall the school will have 200 students in the medical education program and nearly 100 residents in postgraduate training.

Business customers should call-338-1595 instead of 338-9811 to place an order for service or request a change in existing service.


Residential customers should continue to call 482-4493 to make service requests.

Pigs do grunt when they eat, and they get their noses in their food, but their living situations have greatly improved over the times when they wallowed around in a mud hole.

A visitor to a modern hog farm will see pigs housed in buildings worth more than a hundred thousand dollars, and that's more than the worth of a lot of our Today's pigs are raised indoors on slatted floors that allow the manure to fall through into a pit. The waste is pumped out and used on crops. With modern machinery it can be injected into the soil which eliminates a good deal of the odor.

In a modern confinement barn, the hogs are healthier and better fed.

One of the real advantages of the modern system can be seen in the farrowing house. The mother sow is given a perfect environment to nurse the young pigs and the pigs are protected from the mother sow rolling over on them. Too, a sow giving birth in bad weather would lose most of her litter and, therfore, indoor farrowing is good for both the sow and the pigs.

So, to live like a pig isn't quite the same as it used to be.
