

Art Exhibit Planned

The Visiting Artist Program is a cooperative effort of the North Carolina Department of Community Colleges and the North Carolina Arts Council to place professional artists in residence in community colleges and technical institutes for the benefit of citizens in communities throughout the state. The October exhibition at Green Hill Art Gallery will feature the works of the twelve visual artists in residence across the state.

The artists working in painting, drawing, or mixed media are: Betty Harris (Isothermal Community College), Karen Leonard Liles (Anson Technical College), Richard Mayberry (Mayland Technical College), Jeremiah Miller (Blue Ridge Technical College), Audrey Olsen (Western Piedmont Community College), Karen Parrella (Richmond Technical College), Michael Rhodes (Haywood Technical Institute), David C. Smith (James Sprunt Technical College). Other artist include works in clay by Willie Baumcom - Grimes (Cleveland Technical

College), fiber works by Susanne Yowell (Durham Technical Institute), and woodworking by Davis Strider (Surray Community College).

The exhibition, founded by the North Carolina Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts, will tour to three other galleries from November through April 1983: Farthing Art Gallery at Appalachian State University in Boone, Spirit Square in Charlotte, and the Waterworks Gallery in Salisbury. Green Hill Art Gallery is located in downtown Greensboro at the Arts Center at Friendly and Davie Streets. As a non-profit art gallery and educational facility, Green Hill features the contemporary visual arts of North Carolina.

Tips On Preventing Salmonella Infection

As the weather gets warmer and our activities turn to the outdoors, picnics and family cookouts become a weekend way of life. Pleasant days, warm temperatures, and plenty of food—the perfect breeding ground for salmonella.

Salmonella is one of the most common foodborne illnesses and it is estimated to affect more than one million persons each year. Symptoms of salmonella illness are diarrhea, stomach cramps, vomiting, and fever. This illness, often mistaken for the 24-hour flu, is seldom fatal but can be serious for infants, the elderly and chronically ill persons.

Salmonella organisms are found most frequently in raw animal products—meats, poultry, and eggs. While refrigeration and freezing retard their growth and cooking destroys them, salmonella organisms multiply rapidly at temperatures between 45 and 114 degrees F.

Contaminated fresh meats do not usually contain salmonella at levels high enough to produce illness. However, they are frequently the vehicles that carry salmonella into the kitchen.

This cross contamination can occur when a knife or cutting board, used to cut raw meat or poultry, is not washed before coming in contact with another food. Once cross contamination has taken place, salmonella may multiply to hazardous levels if the food is held for several hours at room temperatures or refrigerated in such a large amount that it cools very slowly.

To prevent illness from salmonella:

—Avoid cross contamination by using hot, soapy water to wash hands, utensils, cutting boards, or counter tops that have been in contact with raw meats.

—Do NOT thaw meats or poultry at room temperature. If it is necessary to speed up the thawing, use cool running water.

—Refrigerate leftovers promptly and heat them thoroughly before serving.

If serious foodborne illness is suspected, call your physician. It will also help to wrap up and label the container of food and keep it in the refrigerator for possible inspection by health authorities.

Veteran Population To Decline

The number of living U.S. veterans will decrease by about 40 per cent during the next 50 years, according to data released by the Veterans Administration.

The total veteran population, assuming no future U.S. involvement in armed conflict, will fall from the current level of 30-million to about 18.2-million by the year 2030.

The aged veteran population will grow dramatically during the next 20 years. Veterans 65 and older will increase from the present mark of 3.2-million to nearly 9.2-million before the turn of the century.

California is expected to maintain its position as the state with the largest

number of living veterans, although its veteran total will fall from 3.3-million to an estimated 1.9-million by the year 2030. Alaska's veteran population will continue to be the smallest, falling to 24,200 in 2030.
