

Business Activity Slower

Business activity in North Carolina moderately weakened in June, according to the Wachovia Business Index. The Index registered 153.3, down 0.8 per cent from the revised May level.

Non - agricultural employment decreased due to losses in both manufacturing and non - manufacturing industries. The manufacturing work-week grew modestly; however, average hourly earnings for manufacturing employees declined when price adjusted. Seasonally adjusted, the number of people unemployed in the state was 260,100 in June, down 5,500 from May.

Manufacturing employment fell 0.8 per cent in June, with both durable and non - durable goods industries reporting lower employment levels. In durable goods industries, employment in furniture and lumber declined while employment was up in electrical and non - electrical machinery. All sectors of non - durable goods industries experienced

employment losses.

In the non - manufacturing sector, construction, trade and government employment was below the previous month while services employment remained unchanged.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for North Carolina was 8.9 per cent in June, down 0.1 per cent from May. The national rate for June was unchanged at 9.5 per cent in May.

Unit sales of cars and trucks for the first six months of 1982 were down 15.8 per cent respectively from year ago levels.

Hints For Travel-Induced Jet Lag

Summer brings vacation time climes for people. But for travelers flying overseas over more than four time zones, the first vacation experience could be the debilitating feeling called "jet lag."

The problem is due to disturbing the body's daily rhythms with drastic time changes or longer than normal waking hours. According to the North Carolina Medical Society a traveler can take precautions to minimize jet lag fatigue.

For two or three weeks before the flight, a traveler should gradually improve his - her general fitness with a walking program, up to

three miles daily.

Trip preparations should be completed at least 48 hours prior to takeoff to allow a period of relaxation, free from pressure.

If possible, the traveler should schedule a day flight, with morning departure if possible, remaining close to his home schedule for eating and sleeping, thus arriving at or around his usual bedtime.

During a day flight, with a morning departure, the traveler should avoid sleeping. On a night flight, though, a brief inflight nap is advised.

After the flight, the traveler should take carefully planned sleep and

rest during the first 24 hours. An eastbound day flight from the United States to Europe should be followed by a good night's sleep before sightseeing. An eastbound night flight calls for a morning nap, a leisurely afternoon, and an early bedtime.

Westbound, however, the traveler literally races the sun across the sky and arrives at his destination with local time much the same as the time of departure. The many hours of elapsed time make a long day. Going to bed early and sleeping late are essential.
