

Revival Services Noted

Anderson United Methodist Church in Hertford will hold revival services August 15 - 19. Beginning Sunday evening at 7:30 P.M., the services will include special music, preaching by the Reverend John Hobbs, and a nursery will be provided each night at the church.



John Hobbs serves as President of Maranatha Ministries Unlimited. A graduate of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, and Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C., Hobbs has served in the pastoral ministry and, since 1978, has served full time in a ministry of Evangelism. Now an Evangelist of the North

Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, his ministry takes him to many local churches for special preaching missions, revivals, Bible Studies, and retreats. Congregations have experienced "much spiritual growth and renewal, real growth through informal teaching and sharing, and a rededication of lives," according to the N.C. Christian Advocate.

Maranatha Ministries Unlimited is a non-profit organization, serving as the vehicle from which its founders can respond to the call to Evangelism. The theme of the ministry is simple and direct; namely Jesus Christ is Lord and Savior to all.

In addition to the preaching, Hobbs will teach Bible Studies each morning, Monday through Thursday, August 16 - 19, at Anderson Church. The studies begin at 9:30 A.M., and the public is invited to attend.

Special music for the worship services will be provided by Rev. Kenny Davis, of Rocky Mount, an accomplished pianist and soloist. Philip White of Tyner, will be guest soloist, and the three Anderson choirs will sing as well.

Special Needs Exhibition

WHAT IF YOU COULDN'T...? An Exhibition About Special Needs opens at the North Carolina Museum of Life and Science, on the 31st of July in the museum's education building.

What if you couldn't walk or what if you couldn't see very well? What if you had problems with your feelings or learning to read? **WHAT IF YOU COULDN'T...?**, a participatory exhibition which creates an environment in which the non-disabled public can learn about handicapping conditions and explore some of their feeling about these disabilities opens at the North Carolina Museum of Life and Science on July 31.

The exhibition is divided into six areas of exploration: visual impairments, auditory impairments, physical handicaps, learning disabilities, emotional disturbances and mental retardation. Each area provides information through special graphics and text designed and written for children and adults, simulation with devices and activities such as a wheel chair and a variety of surface coverings, a blind walk, try-on prosthetic devices, and role playing suggestions.

WHAT IF YOU COULDN'T...? was organized by the Boston Children's Museum with funds from the National Endowment for the Arts. It is being circulated nationally under the auspices of the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES). This exhibition attempts to promote an improved understanding of, and a better attitude toward people with disabilities. Local sponsorship of the exhibit is through grants from the Durham Arts Council, the State of North Carolina Grassroots Arts Program and the Triangle Luncheon Civitan Club. According to Carol Council, President of Triangle Civitan, "Our club is proud to sponsor an exhibit on handicaps. Civitan has been especially interested in helping the handicapped. We also sponsor the Special Olympics. Our fund raising projects such as the Christmas wrapping booths and our fashion show September 8th help make our contributions possible."

The North Carolina Museum of Life and Science invites your participation with this show which will be here through September 1.

Conference To Be Held

RALEIGH — The Annual Safety Conference of the North Carolina Motor Carriers Association Safety, Security and Personnel Council will be held August 6 - 8 at Wrightsville Beach.

NCMCA President Marshall W. Henry, Jr. of Rocky Mount, vice president and general manager of C.S. Henry Transfer, Inc., will address the group on behalf of the trucking industry. Mr. Henry will also present the Association's N.C. Safety Director of the Year award.

In addition to President Henry's address, convention highlights will include the presentation of State Truck Fleet Safety Awards and Industrial Safety Awards. On Saturday morning, August 7th, there will be a panel presentation by North Carolina state government officials. The panelists are: Lt. Col. Jack W. Cardwell, N.C. Highway Patrol; Donald D. Coordes, assistant director, Transportation Division, N.C. Utilities Commission; and Harold Megredy, safety director, N.C. Industrial Commission. R.W. Wilkins, Jr., N.C. Motor Vehicles Commissioner, will serve as panel moderator.

Other speakers will include: Alan Hale, Kernersville, representing Trailmobile, co-sponsor of

the Fleet Safety Contest; J.B. Heglar, Bruce Johnson Trucking Co., State Truck Rodeo chairman; Harold B. Clark, Rapid Transport, past ATA Safety Council Chairman, both of Charlotte; and James K. Davis, Old Dominion Freight Line, Inc., High Point, Road Patrol Co-chairman.

Other convention activities will include: election of officers and business session; golf; awards banquet; Hawaiian Luau; and two dances.

Earl Buchan, Kemp Furniture Industries, Inc., Goldsboro, Council vice chairman also serves as convention chairman. The three-day conference will end Sunday with a planning session by the newly elected officers and steering committee.

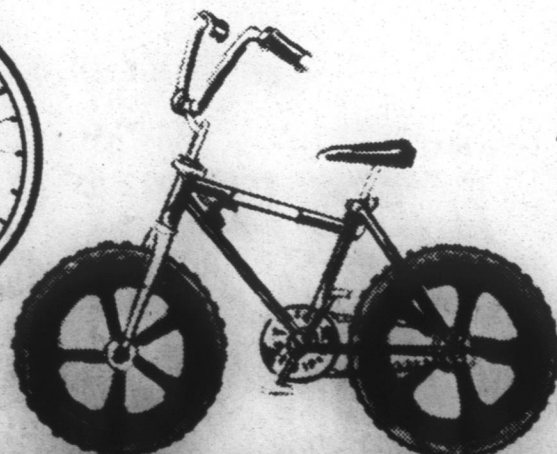
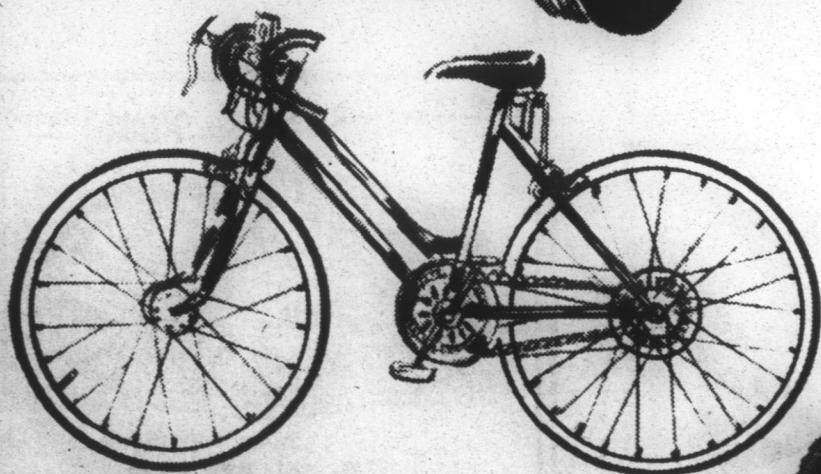
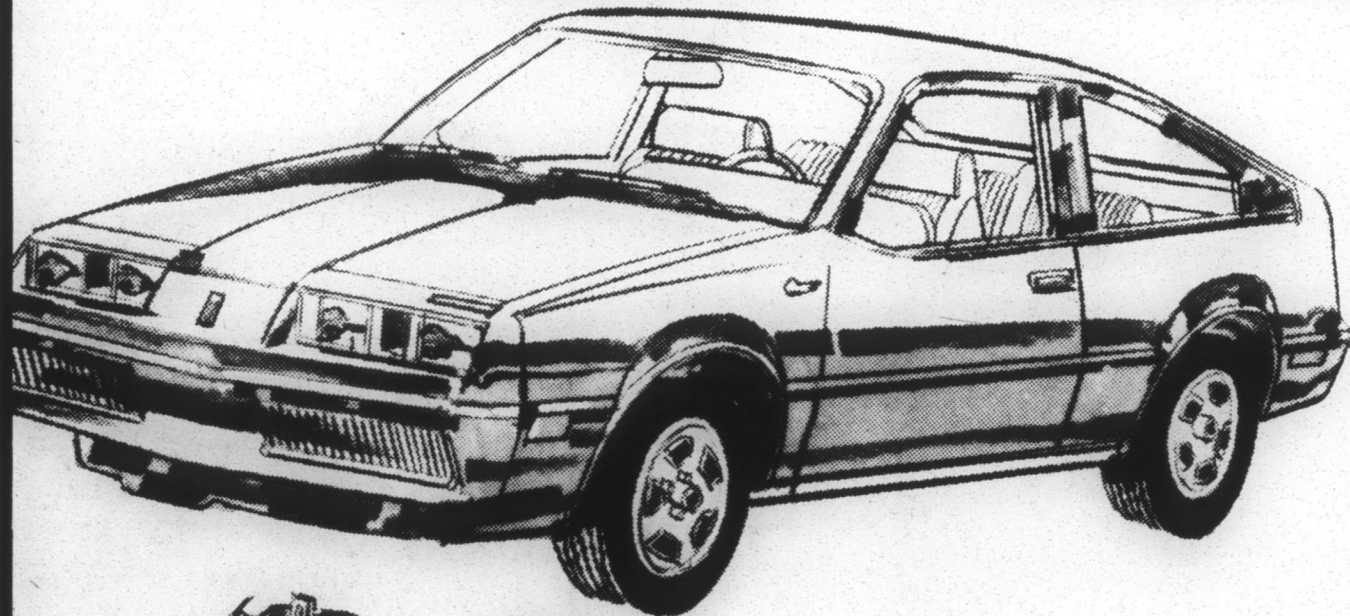
