



BUSINESS INDEX—The level of business activity in North Carolina increased moderately in August, according to the Wachovia Business Index.

N.C. Business Index

Business activity in North Carolina increased moderately in August, according to the Wachovia Business Index. The index registered 151.8, up 0.7 per cent from the July level.

Non-agricultural employment remained virtually flat in August, while the average manufacturing workweek increased 2.4 per cent. Price-adjusted average hourly earnings for manufacturing employees declined 0.6 per cent from the previous month. Seasonally adjusted, the number of people unemployed increased by 22,100.

Manufacturing employment was up 0.5 per cent in August, with both durable and non-durable goods industries showing moderate employment growth. However, this gain was countered by a loss of 0.5 per cent in non-manufacturing employment. Contract construction, trade, services and government all

registered employment declines.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for North Carolina was 9.4 per cent in August, up 0.8 per cent from July. The national rate for August was 9.8 per cent, unchanged from July. The unadjusted unemployment rate in North Carolina was 9.0 per cent in August.

Unit sales of cars and trucks through August were below year ago levels by 18.7 per cent and 4.7 per cent respectively.

The Wachovia North Carolina Business Index measures the level of economic activity in North Carolina on a monthly basis. Using 1967 as the base of 100, it reflects indicators of employment, production and spending in the state's economy. All figures are adjusted by Wachovia-calculated figures for expected seasonal fluctuations.

In the second game, Fisher overcame their defeat in week one by shelling the Redskins by a 30-20 score. Wallace Holley silenced the Redskins with touchdown runs of 15, 31, 41, and 51 yards. Tony White added another TD on a one

yard run. The Nixon brothers were the heart of their team's attack with two touchdowns and one extra point conversion. William Hill tallied on a 51 yard scamper to complete the Redskins scoring. Action continues every Monday night at Fisher Field.
