10 - 6:00—Skipjack "Norfolk" & pirate ship "Sinbad" open for limited boarding - closed just prior to and during battle; Barker House Gift Shop open; Colonial military camps open to public for "Living History".

10:30—Hoppin' John available on green - limited quantity.

10:30 - 2:00—Fortunes told by the Witch Woman.

10:30 - 4:30—Hayrides between American & British camps; Stocks available for arrest of "suspicious characters" by Colonial soldiers (bribes accepted).

10:30 - 3:30—Special Childrens' Activities - A full schedule of typical 18th century games (see "special events") plus continuous hands on activities including hoop-rolling, top-spinning, Christmas tree decorations, juggling instructions (10:30 - 2:30 only) and much more.

12:00 - 6:00—Brunswick stew plates available. \$3.50 each - advance tickets on sale in Barker House (482-3663) or special ticket booth - Colonial park.

*The skipjack "Norfolk" is here as a special goodwill gesture from the city of Norfolk. The "Norfolk" is one of the few remaining authentic skipjacks from the Chesapeake Bay, built in 1903, and is operated by Nautical Adventures Inc. as a sea explorer sail training vessel. The "Meka II" is owned and operated by Sinbad, the only licensed privateer operating in the coastal waters of the U.S. Both vessels will be available for limited boarding and inspection except when participating in a battle as scheduled.

*The award-winning second North Carolina Regiment of Foote is hosting a 100 person military encampment of men, women and children in authentic 18th century dress, living as they might have in Revolutionary War times. Other participants include the 1st Virginia Regiment, 6th North Carolina Regiment, Guilford Militia, 84th Highland Grenadier Company, N.C. Highland Regiment, 23rd Welsh Fusiliers, 3rd company Fourth Kings' Own, Frasers 71st Highlanders, and Kentucky Militia (frontiersmen). Demonstrations include tomahawk throwing; candle dipping; spinning; musket cleaning, loading & firing; dulcimer, concertina, bagpipe & harp playing; and much more to continue throughout Saturday and on Sunday until 3:00.

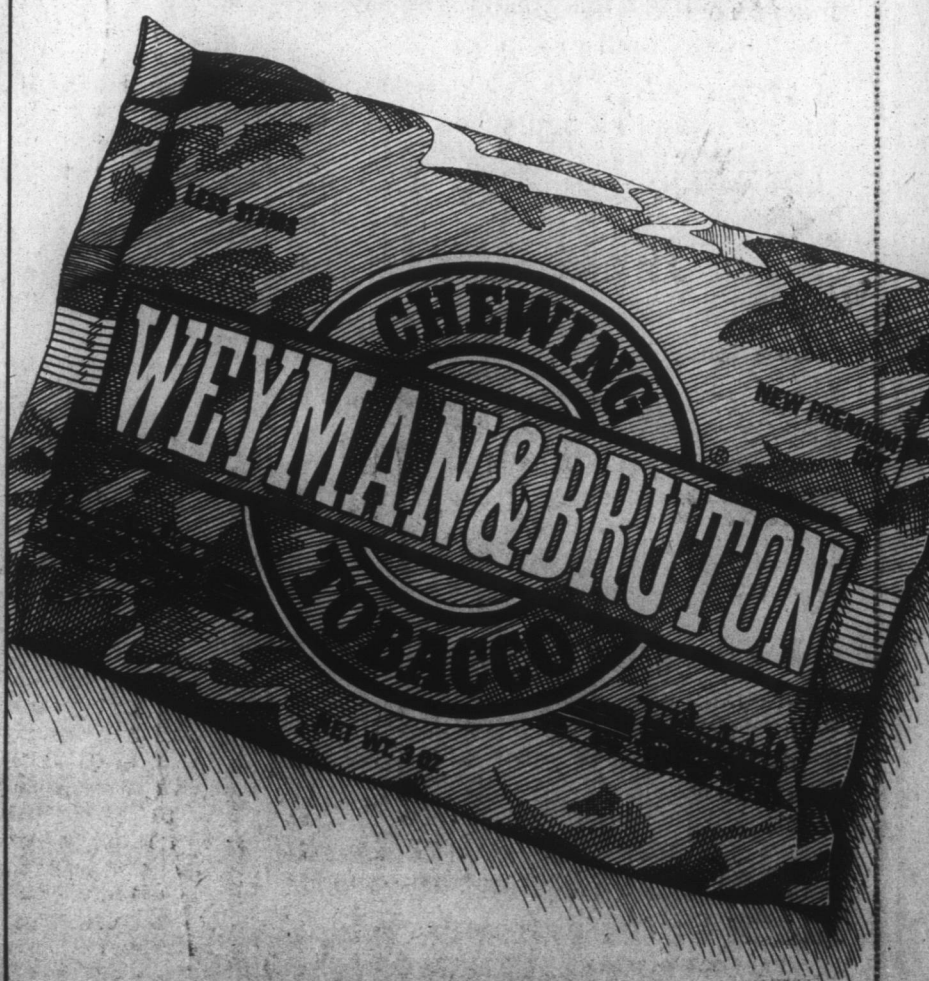
