

White "The Southern Sportsman", Takes Challenge

Franc White, known to outdoor enthusiasts in six states as "The Southern Sportsman", takes on a new challenge this year as he serves as the Honorary Chairman of the 1982 Christmas Seal campaign for the American Lung Association of North Carolina.

White has hosted "The Southern Sportsman," for ten years since the show's debut on WITN-TV in Washington, N.C. in 1972. The television series is now syndicated

weekly to 20 stations in the Carolinas, Georgia, Maryland, Virginia, and West Virginia covering every major market.

White also publishes a magazine under the same name that reaches thousands of outdoorsmen. He has written articles for many national publications, including Sports Afield, The American Hunter and Salt Water Sportsman.

As well as providing tips for fishermen and hunters, White is well-known for the cooking segments of his

show; his love of good food has led him into the restaurant business.

Born in Sylacauga, Alabama in 1928, White became interested in journalism in the Army during World War II. After the war he was a reporter for the Birmingham Age Herald. His

involvement with broad-casting about the outdoors began with fishing forecasts he gave on WSOC-TV in Charlotte.

White has a co-chairman of sorts for the Christmas Seal campaign; Fracas, his Irish setter who appears on every telecast.

1982 will be the 76th year

of Christmas Seals in North Carolina. Originally a fund-raising effort to fight tuberculosis, the Christmas Seals program now provides financial support for research, education and health services to combat emphysema, chronic bronchitis, asthma, and other lung diseases.

21st Future Farmers Clinic

The 21st Annual Albemarle Future Farmers of America Woodland Clinic was held on October 21 in Pasquotank County. L. C. Bunch, District Chairman, reports that four Chapters from the Albemarle District and one from the Gates District participated in the contest. Approximately 35 students tried their skills on the woodland exercises.

Each year the North Carolina Forest Service assists the District with the contest by selecting the test

sites and supervising the event. Tree identification, thinning procedures, volume estimates and other woodland management practices are among the exercises that contestants are scored on.

Prize money is provided each year by Union Camp Corporation and Jones Lumber Company. This year's \$50 first place award went to the Gates FFA Chapter. The Northeastern Chapter from Pasquotank County placed second for a

\$25 prize and Currituck placed third for a \$10 prize. The Chowan and Camden Chapters also participated in the event.

Unemployment Rate

RALEIGH — North Carolina's statewide total unemployment rate fell to 8.7 per cent in September from 9 per cent in August, according to Glenn R. Jernigan, chairman of the N.C. Employment Security Commission (ESC).

"This decrease for the second consecutive month can be attributed primarily to workers being recalled from temporary layoff. It appears that some employers have, so far, been able to use temporary layoff periods in order to maintain production staff and avoid permanent plant closings." Shorter working hours have been in effect also. The average weekly hours worked by production workers in manufacturing dropped to 38.2 in mid-September from 38.8 in mid-August. In mid-September, 1981, workers averaged 38.6 hours per week.

Manufacturing jobs overall showed a net gain of 2,700. Improvement occurred principally in Furniture and Fixtures which gained 1,400 (1.8 per cent) jobs in the durable goods sector. In nondurable goods, Textile Mill Products posted a slight reversal (-0.3 per cent) when 600 jobs were lost. Temporary layoffs could account for the change. Nonmanufacturing jobs gained 43,400 (2.8 per cent) positions as the Government sector experienced the return to work by teachers and support personnel employed by the school systems. This is an annual occurrence when school sessions resume. Seasonal influence was felt in Service and Trade jobs as the tourist vacation period ended around Labor day at the shore. Service jobs declined 1,100 (-0.3 per cent) and Trade was down 1,400 (-0.3 per cent).

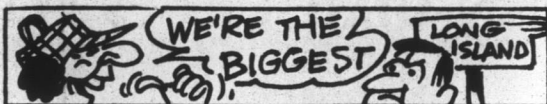
Economic Recovery Act

Greensboro — When the All-Savers Certificates were included as a tax break in the Economic Recovery Act of 1981, it was believed that their popularity would blossom into real nest eggs for many purchasers. That has proved to be true, the Internal Revenue Service says.

So, the IRS has announced

that under certain circumstances All-Savers that are automatically renewed have a 1-year maturity for the second year. The Economic Recovery Act of 1981 excludes from tax up to \$1,000 of interest, or \$2,000 on a joint return, for qualifying 1-year cer-
