Protecting "Hard" Contacts

Hard contact lenses can be scratched otherwise damaged if mishandled. The following tips are intended to help you protect your lenses and your investment. When not wearing the lenses, always keep them in the case, in soaking solution. Do not leave the lenses where they will be subjected to extremes of heat. Such conditions can cause the lenses to become warped. When removing the lenses, cup the hand underneath the eye to keep them from falling to the floor. However, if you do drop a lens, pick it up with a wet finger. Scraping it across a surface to pick it up may cause scratches. When you place the lenses

in the case, be sure that they are centered and flat. Otherwise, they may become warped in the closed case. When cleaning the lenses, always rub them gently so as not to warp or scratch the surfaces. Always wash your hands to remove any dust or dirt that might scratch the lenses.

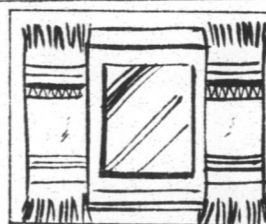

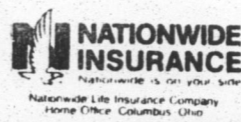

Overcrowding Can Be Serious

In Japan, the trains are so crowded that they have official "pushers" to force all the commuters inside before the doors close. Frankly, I don't think Japanese commuters like to be overcrowded. On the other hand, your teeth don't like to be overcrowded either. In fact, there are a host of serious dental problems that can emerge from tooth crowding.

The earlier this problem is discovered, the easier it will be to correct. That's why you should be concerned about your child's mouth. Ask your son or daughter to open his mouth wide so you can take a look inside. Are the teeth in good alignment? No twisting or overlapping teeth? Where gaps ex-

ist, is there ample room for the permanent teeth to emerge? Does your child bite comfortably on all of his back teeth?

Let's face it - most parents don't have the training to see the dental problems that can occur as their child is growing up. That's why regular dental checkups are so important. Maybe the problem is minor. But left untreated it may get worse and require major and costly treatment, which may have been avoided if caught and corrected early.
