HI, NEIGHBORS! Remember the times you watched as loved ones and friends were baptised in the river - and - the surge of pure joy that filled your heart as you watched the minister lead the candidates into water, fully immerse them one by one in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost? As the minister led them back to shore, the soul experienced elation and real happiness - one felt like shouting "Hallelujah"! Our Worship Service June 12, was concluded down by the Chowan River in Arrowhead Beach where two of our young people were so baptised. Inadvertently, the paragraph describing this event was left out of the Notebook last week. Out of respect for these young folk and their relatives, I am repeating it, as follows:

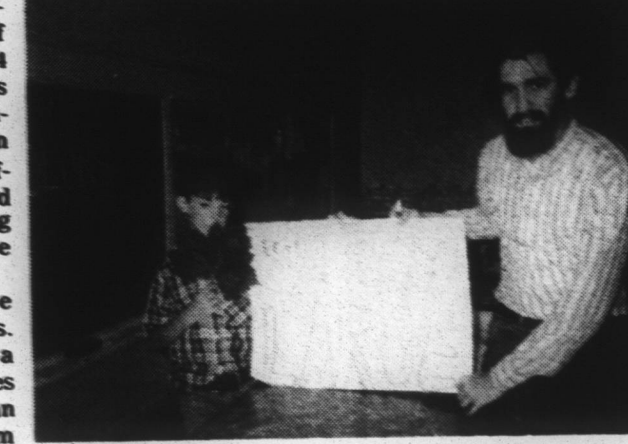
List your potential expenses. They may include business cards, advertising, cost of supplies and perhaps

Add the total annual expenses to the amount of profit you want. Make your calculations as realistic as possible.

Income from your business must be reported on tax forms as income from self-employment. If your profit is more than \$400, Social Security taxes will have to be paid.

Mr. Nixon Is Promoted

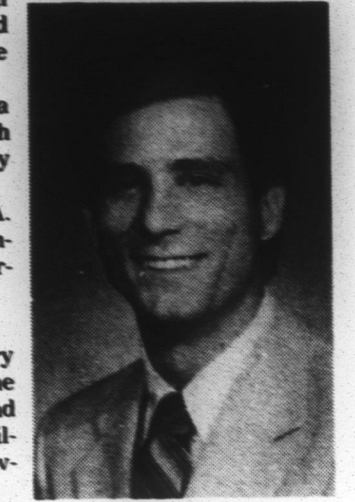
