Timeline set for school plans

Public hearings on future high school site Sept. 17, 19 **BY MILES LAYTON** Staff writer

Chowan County residents will have at least two opportunities next month to weigh in on whether they'd like to see the county's current high school renovated or a new high school built. If they favor a new school, citizens can also recommend where they'd like to see it built.

The first public input session on site selection for the new high school will be held at 6 p.m. Sept. 17 at the current high school, John A. Holmes. The second will be held at 6 p.m. Sept. 19 at the Northern Chowan Recreation Center Both Chowan commissioners and members of the Edenton-Chowan Board of Education say the meetings are important to learning more about what financial adviser and a conthe public wants before moving forward. For months, a joint committee of school board members and county commissioners have met, listened to experts and

discussed the high school project. Progress has been slow because of the enormity of the decision and because funding sources for the project remain unclear.

The project is estimated to cost between \$35 million and \$44 million — an amount that may be funded from a combination of sources, including proceeds from a bond referendum. Because current estimated costs are more than a few years old, experts who have spoken to the joint committee contend that future construction costs may change.

Last week, both boards set deadlines for formulating plans for the new high school.
