Will It Be Bottled Up? We clip the following from the Constitution of 29th:

Will the Marrietta and North Georgia railroad be bottled up this side of Knoxville?

It is rumored in vailroad circles that matters between that road and the East Tennessee are not satisfactory, and unless something is done the road will not be permitted to cross the Tennessee river.

At present the road goes into Knoxville over the Marysville branch of the East Tennessee. If the consent of the East Tennessee is withdrawn, there will be nothing left for the Marrietta and North Georgia railroad to do but to build its own bridge across the Tennesses or stay out of

The road being in the hands of a eceiver in no way could the necessary bridge and track be built except by issuing receiver's certificates. A call was made yestere by on Judge Henry B. Tompkius, to ascertain the truth of the rumor, but it was

found that he was out of the city, having gone to Knoxville. Judge Tompkins represents the bondholders, and it is presumed that he is now in Knoxville for the purpose of seeing if existing differences cannot be adjusted.
