Heavy Volume of Car Buying to Mark New Year, Says Edsel Ford

President of Ford Motor Company Reveals new Condition Facing Manufacturers.

"The demand for automobiles during 1923 will be greater than during other years in the history of the motorized country." This statement made by Edsel B. Ford, President of the Ford Motor Company, is based upon an analysis recently made in connection with the sales of Ford and Lincoln Motor Cars.

"But the car market is very sensitive," he added with a chuckle. "I feel that a certain amount of caution is to be exercised in the survival of the market, and the manufacturer who comes up with a desire to get a lot of sales without consideration of what he gives in return for the ownership, confidence, placed in his product, is not likely to find the year successful."

"Sales of cars of this type are not necessarily restricted to the centers of large populations. Such a condition in the past has brought about by the fact of facilities for bringing the purchase of such cars to the smaller localities. So in the quality car field, there is a large and undeveloped field of sales."

"In the sale of smaller cars many dealers have had difficulty in supplementary car sales where small cars, convenient to operate, are being used as money changers by owners of large cars. There are many sales opportunities for every dealer in this particular class of business. This year will see many remarkable developments along these lines."

"Competition in sales are constantly to be faced maximum as the buyers represented by our industrial and commercial enterprises gain confidence in certain types of commercial car equipment."

"The heavy volume of buying will come with dealers and manufacturers who go out after the dormant period."

"Projects of the law of diminishing returns which are constantly taking place, point out to look at the true perspective which is that this country is one of such constant and enduring opportunities that there will always be more business than can be taken care of. Public belief and confidence are the necessary factors in favor of increasing business. With these there can be no lack of discriminating returns."

"We find certain of our larger cities where the population which goes nearly a 100 percent change every seven years. Where can the law of diminishing returns find a place in the face of these conditions? The dealer is facing a steady turnover in customers coming almost as rapidly as he can adjust himself to the actual business in sight."

"Never before, in the history of the Ford Motor Company, have we made such exhaustive preparation for business as we have been making in the past few months."
