

MILLION AND HALF FOLK BOUGHT NEW FORDS IN ONE YEAR

Huge Volume of Business Handled By Detroit Manufacturer Since April 1, 1922

Detroit, Mich.—More than 1,500,000 new car buyers have joined the great Ford family in the United States in the last year.

This is shown by retail sales records of the Ford Motor Company.

During April last year more than 100,000 Ford cars and trucks were delivered to retail customers in the United States and this record has been maintained unbroken every month since that time. Easter this year completed one full year in which Ford's have been going into the market at the rate of more than 100,000 a month, bringing the total well over 1,500,000 for the twelve month period.

Since the price reduction of \$50 last October, which brought Ford cars and trucks to the lowest level in the history of the Ford Motor Company, and with sales running above the 100,000 mark for the five consecutive months since, the saving to Ford car buyers in that time thru the reduction had added more than \$25,000,000 to their purchasing power for other necessities and illustrates the thought behind Henry Ford's famous saying, "Buy a Ford and spend the difference."

Ford Motor, No. 7,000,000 was turned out January 17 of this year. Since then more than a quarter million more have been produced, and so great is the demand for Ford cars and trucks that at present dealers' stocks throughout the country are practically exhausted.



SELL AND EAT SWEET POTATOES WEEK APRIL 16

Raleigh.—The week of April 16 is sweet potato week in North Carolina and agricultural workers of the State College and State Department of Agriculture are endeavoring to help the farmers of the State move their surplus. Gorrell Shumaker, of the Division of Markets, has written a letter to all produce merchants asking them to stock up and push the sale of potatoes and to reduce their margin of profit for the time being in order that as many consumers as possible may be able to buy.

Director B. W. Kilgore, of the Agricultural Extension Service, has asked the farm agents to get behind the scheme and try to help their co-operating farmers sell all surplus potatoes. Mrs. Jang S. McKimmon and her force of workers will try to popularize sweet potato dishes and hold demonstrations showing how to make the best meals with the potato.

The idea back of the whole movement as outlined by Mr. Shumaker, is to relieve the farmers of some of their surplus stocks. Many growers in boll weevil districts and in areas where tobacco wilt was prevalent put in a surplus of potatoes and now find that they have no market for them. It is a patriotic act on the part of North Carolina citizens to help these folks out of their dilemma by buying such stocks as will be needed during this week.

Mr. Shumaker requests and urges all householders in North Carolina, all public institutions, colleges and other organizations to buy sweet potatoes this week to use up the surplus so that the money now tied up in this chop may be released for other farm purposes.

ENFORCE DIPPING LAW, URGES THIS TEXAS JUDGE

"Don't let any man be arbitrary and think he can go out and blow up a vat and stop the functioning of the whole government," said District Judge Hugh Carney, in charging the grand jury of Cass County, Texas, recently.

Judge Carney expressed hesitance about mentioning the cattle dipping law because of the fact that several vats had been blown up in the county following his charge to the jury in 1921, and again 14 vats were blown up following this occasion in 1922. Since that time, however, a conviction had been obtained in this court, and the sentence had been upheld by the Criminal Court of Appeals, and no more violations or acts of violence against the dipping law are expected in Cass County, Texas.

Judge Carney said further, "We have a new inspector this year and I urge the people to meet him over halfway and do the right thing. At first we didn't believe we could ever get rid of the fever ticks, but it is my understanding that at the close of last year's dipping season there were only 47 holders of cattle in the county infested with the tick. Let every man be a good citizen and enforce the law."

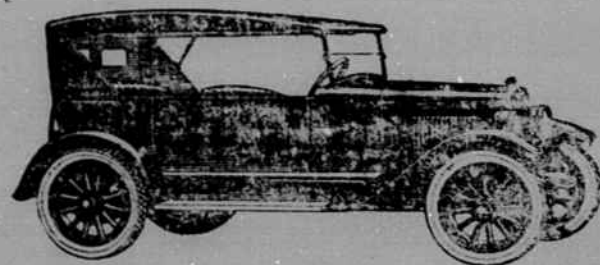
