Mr. W. B. Gartrell, formerly in the wholesale goods business here, but now of Knoxville, Tenn., has been here this week on business.

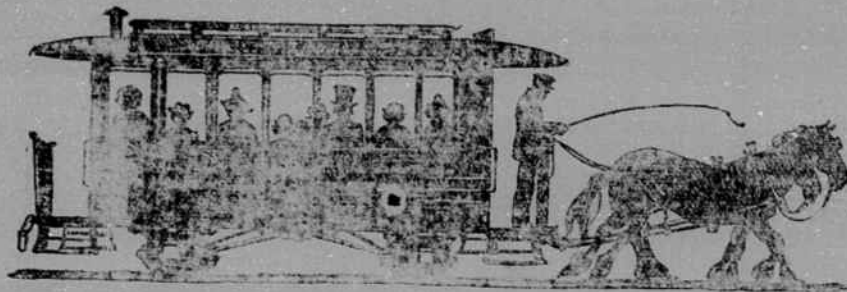
Messes. Samuel and Giles Cover were in Murphy Thursday on business.
