ELECTION FOR CITY CALLED FOR MAY 6TH

A complete new registration has been Ordered—T. W. Axley is The Registrar

At the regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Murphy on Thursday night, April 3rd, an election for the purpose of naming a Mayor and six members of the Board of Commissioners was called for Tuesday, May 6th, the day provided by law for the election of officers. At the same time a new registration of all the qualified voters in the Town was ordered. This means that all who expect to vote in the coming election will have to register, both those who have been voting and those who will vote for the first time.

T. W. Axley has been appointed registrar and will have the books at the Murphy Hardware Company store on and after April 12 to and including Saturday May third. Voters may register at this place at any time within the period stated.

Messrs. Henry Akin and P. E. Nelson were appointed judges of the election.

Dates Set For Road Building and Maintenance Demonstration

June 3rd, to 10th, inclusive, are the dates set for the Road Building and Maintenance Demonstration which will be held in North Carolina under the auspices of the America Road Builders' Association in connection with the North Carolina State Highway Commission at which time between 40 and 50 delegates from South and Central American Countries will be in North Carolina as a part of their trip throughout the United States in order to familiarize themselves with the methods of financing, constructing, and maintaining highways as carried on in this country. All of these visitors are men of high rank in highway work in their respective countries. They are to assemble in Washington on June 1st, and on June 4th, will arrive in Raleigh, North Carolina, where they will be shown how to work at the headquarters of the State Highway Commission is carried on. While they will also be shown the garage of the State Highway Commission, one of the largest of its kind in the United States, where all of the motor equipment used by the State in its highway work is kept in first-class condition.

From Raleigh the party will be escorted to Greensboro where the

Central Demonstration, which will begin on June 3rd, will be in full swing. This demonstration is to be staged at the Fair Grounds near the city which affords ample room for the demonstration of all kinds of road building and maintenance equipment. Heretofore it has been customary to exhibit machinery of this kind in a building with the machinery dressed up in its best clothes but at the exhibit aforementioned it will be seen in actual operation—a feature which, up to the present time has not been attempted.

June is an ideal month in North Carolina to hold an outdoor show of this kind as the weather conditions at this season are such as will enable all visitors to enjoy the demonstrations without and discomfort from cold or heat. Already manufacturers of various kinds of road-building equipment have expressed their intention of exhibiting their products at this Central Demonstration and visitors may rest assured that they will see the most modern machinery

and equipment, not painted up and surrounded by a brass chain, but in actual operation, performing the duty for which it is designed. Each of these exhibits will be in charge of an experienced operator who will answer all questions regarding the work.

While the Central Demonstration is in progress the South American engineers and other official delegates will be carried out on actual construction work that is in progress in and around Greensboro. These trips will include practically every type of road construction, and the projects visited will be equipped with modern and up-to-date machinery in first-class condition, whereby the visitors will have an opportunity to see construction under the most favorable conditions. Tractors will be seen performing their various functions, which are seemingly unlimited; steam shovels digging up the earth; road machines and graders preparing the subgrade for laying concrete or asphalt pavement; concrete mixers combining the various materials necessary for an asphaltic concrete pavement; and other operations too num-

erous to mention. These trips will not be limited to the officials delegates alone but transportation will be furnished without cost to all those affiliated with highway work.
