

### Overland Used On Highest Highway After Power Test

New Mt. Evans, Colo., Road Higher Than Pike's Peak; Other New Overland Records

Marked tribute was paid to the power and stamina of the Overland motor by the state highway department of Colorado by the selection of an Overland for the preliminary work on the new Mt. Evans auto highway which will have the distinction, when completed, of being the highest automobile road in the world, exceeding in altitude that of Pike's Peak by several hundred feet.

This car is now used in survey work which requires operation over almost inaccessible grades, partially constructed roads and even to points which have not yet been touched by a grading crew.

The sale of the Overland was completed only after exhaustive competitive tests with other light cars over some of the roughest roads within the state boundaries. It is the first Overland ever purchased for this work by the Colorado state highway commissioners, but since its preliminary showing it has been decided that all future replacements for mountain work would be made with Overlands. Since the first car was put into service on the Mt. Evans highway additional cars have been added to the highway departments at Delta and Rifle, Colo.

Within the past two weeks have been staged two of the most remarkable demonstrations of the Overland's power in widely spread parts of the country. Before a crowd of 5,000 an overland ascended and descended the meteor-crazed sides of Stone Mountain, the large granite boulder just outside of Atlanta, which is a southern metropolis. About three-quarters of the way up the mountain there is a grade that has never before been negotiated and the most skeptical were positive that this stretch of the journey could not be made. It is a mass of smooth granite with no definite traction. The grade approximates a 45-degree angle. But the car rode over it easily and proceeded to the extreme pinnacle of the mountain.

The descent is even a more perilous phase of the trip. Several cars have chucked the mountain over various crevices, but many of them have required the assistance of block and tackle to return. To demonstrate the car's braking power the Overland returned the same way that it had ascended the mountain.

Near Phoenix, Ariz., in the arid southwest, stands Camelback Mountain, long regarded as impassable by motor car, particularly the spur known locally as Mortarcycle hill approximately a thousand feet long and nothing but a trail over jagged rocks with innumerable acres of soft sand, loose rock and granite that cut tires to ribbons and strangle any motor that dares to brave them.

One Sunday afternoon, just two weeks ago about three thousand men, women and children congregated on the cactus-dotted desert valley points of vantage all over the surrounding country to see an Overland carrying a very heavy load, a total weight of 1,100 pounds, climb the hill, stopping in the middle of the ascent and then, with all momentum lost, proceeding without a due effort to the crest of the mountain, which has since been renamed "Overland Peak" in honor of the occasion.—Ads.

### COUNTY TEXT BOOK COMMISSION ADOPTS BOOKS OF HIGH SCHOOLS

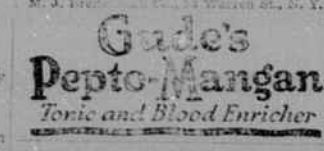

**What is The Prettiest Fruit?**  
Why cherries, of course! Plump little cherries glowing with ruby color, aren't they just the prettiest things? Can't you imagine how good they'll taste made up into juicy cherry tartlets like this:

- 2 cups of self-rising flour,
- 6 tablespoons shortening,
- 1-3 cup cold water,
- 1 quart pitted cherries.

Rub shortening into flour very lightly with finger tips; add water slowly, enough to make stiff dough and roll out very thin. Line patty pans with pastry and let some of the pastry come well over the edges. Bake in a hot oven for about 15 minutes then fill with cherries which have been washed and pitted. Cover with syrup made of 1-2 cup sugar and 1-2 cup cherries added to 2 cups of boiling water. Bring to a boil and strain; add one tablespoon cornstarch which has been mixed with a little cold water. Cook over hot fire for a minute or two stirring constantly—remove and beat hard—return to slow fire and cook until thick. Pour over cherries while hot.
