United States Not Maintaining Its Full Quota Of Ships
 Washington, D. C. May 10—According to a statement made public here to day by Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, the United States is not maintaining her navy at the strength provided for at the armistice conference held in Washington some time ago. "If the strength of Great Britain's navy is five and that of Japan three, then ours would be classed as four," he said. What will result from the making public of the real situation with regard to the strength of the United States navy remains to be seen.
