McAdoo Looms As Certain Nominee, Says Mrs. Cover

Tenth District Delegate Declares the Deadlock Cannot Be Broken

"McAdoo will be nominated like a flash if the Democratic convention is moved from New York City, and there is nothing else left for it to do," declared Mrs. Giles Cover, of Andrews, delegate from the Tenth District, who returned Saturday from the metropolis.

Mrs. Cover, who pictured in a graphic manner the convention efforts of Smith supporters to coerce delegates with a bedlam of noise and charged that thugs are admitted to the convention hall solely for this purpose declared that she left instructions for her ballot to be cast for McAdoo until he withdraws. She will go to Dallas for the California before leaving New York Saturday.

"I know McAdoo's name will not be withdrawn and I predict that the deadlock will not be broken at Madison Square Garden," continued the local delegate. "The convention must be moved away from the bedlam of confusion and the delegates permitted to get down to business. In the event it is moved, there is no question that Mr. McAdoo will be nominated like a flash."

Mrs. Cover gave a graphic description of the hysterical demonstration of Governor Al Smith of New York, stating that the Gothamites did "everything to cause the delegates and especially the women."

"Every conceivable contraption and device that would make a noise was used," she said. "The yells were not only holed but the ruffians and toughs of New York's East side ran through the sides like wild men yelling at the top of their voices and waving banners bearing the words 'Al Smith for President.' These men were admitted deliberately by the Smith supporters for the purpose of frightening the delegates."

"In an effort to get the women delegates to leave the hall when it was seen Smith's faction could not muster up enough votes to call for the nomination, social functions and attractions were arranged for and cordial invitations were extended by the

New Yorkers. The press has carried accurate news and details of the convention, but little has been said about the pervading atmosphere for Smith and the unheard of machination of his advocates to secure his nomination.

"I have believed all the time that McAdoo was the strongest man in the race and I did not change my vote when the North Carolina delegation broke. I knew that little could be accomplished by some of the Tar Heel delegates voting for John W. Davis. At 28 height he mustered only 67 votes. These meant nothing and they did not avoid a deadlock.

"Interest has been so keen in the Smith-McAdoo fight that nothing has been thought of who would be nominated for Vice-President. The conflict has become so hot that fist-fights and assaults among the various delegates create little excitement. Trouble frequently comes when states break and it often leads to blows. Then there are hundreds of fights when the New York bums come in contact with the delegates.

"Nothing has been said about where the convention could be moved to, but many believe that the delegates should be permitted to go home and rest for at least 30 days. The visitors to New York are so disgusted that I know that another Democratic convention will never be held there."

Mrs. Cover admitted that she is a "bit tired after the ordeal."—Asheville Citizen.

Clay County Has Big Potato Crop

Hayesville, July 8.—Clay County farmers now have ready for market approximately six hundred of Irish Columbia potatoes for sale according to announcement given out by County Agent W. E. Anderson, who has been instrumental in stimulating potato growing in the county. Standard graders are being bought so that the product can be properly graded as to size and put on the market as a standard product. The county agent announces that the growers are now ready to place the potatoes on the market and that prospective purchasers may get in touch with them through him.
