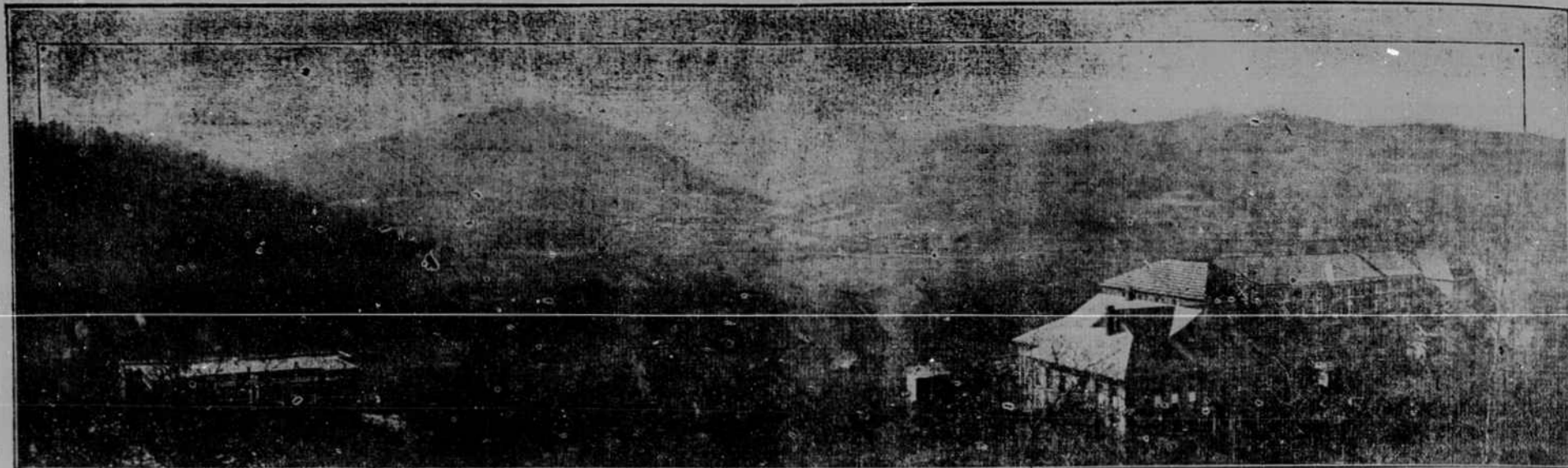


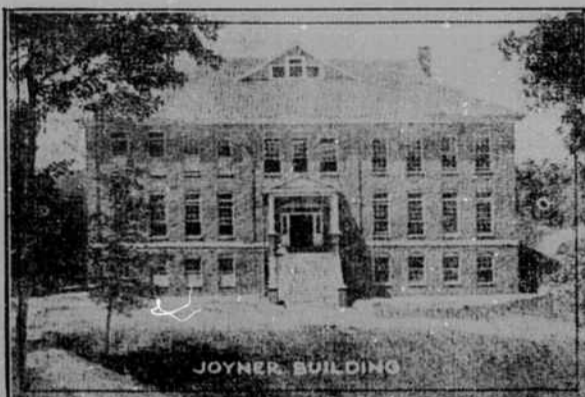

Partial Panorama of Cullowhee Looking From Top of Davies Hall.



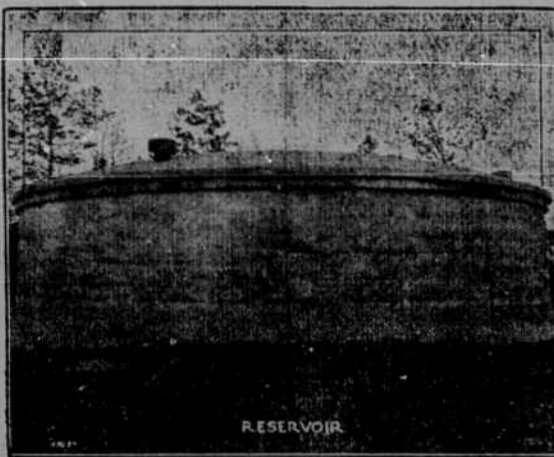

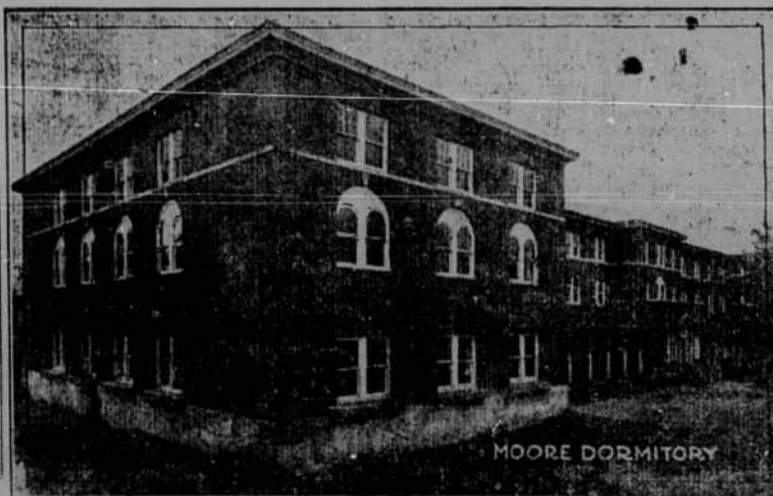

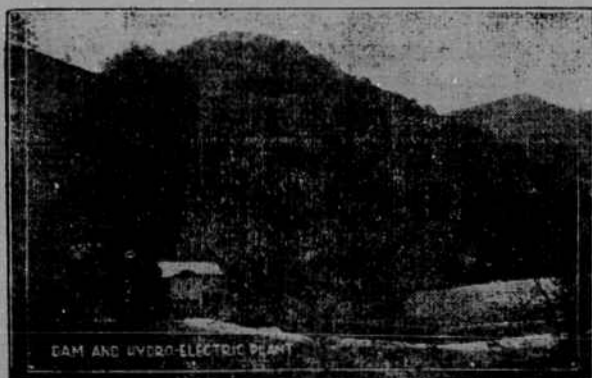
New 200,000-Gallon Reservoir
