NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR ROAD BONDS OF SHOAL CREEK TOWNSHIP, CHEROKEE CO., N. C.

At the regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, North Carolina, on the 7th day of July, 1924, a petition was presented to the said board signed by more than fifty residents, freeholders, and qualified voters of Shoal Creek Township, Cherokee County, N. C., asking that the said board call an election to be submitted to the qualified voters of said township for the issuance of \$50,000 for road purposes for the improvement and construction of the public road leading from the Shallow Ford steel bridge, approximately with the old road as set out in the petition to the Tennessee state line, a distance of about nine miles; also to connect the road with the other public road or highway at the Suit place

in said township, as per the petition filed, approximately a distance of 2 miles, it being approximately with the said old road.

It is ordered by the Board of County Commissioners in regular session on the 7th day of July, 1924, that an election be held in Shoal Creek Township, Cherokee County, N. C., on the 15th day of August, 1924, under the general election laws and local election laws applying to this county at the various precincts in said township in order that the voters of said township may determine whether or not the said board shall issue the \$50,000 road bonds for road improvement and construction as set out in the said petition.

It is ordered by the Board of County Commissioners for the purpose of carrying out and holding the said election in Shoal Creek Township in said county that H. I. Taylor is hereby appointed as Registrar and that J. J. Jones and E. A. Anderson are hereby appointed as Judges of Shoal Creek precinct; that Grief Hembree is hereby appointed as Registrar and H. M. Berrong and Julius Reed are hereby appointed as Judges at Vests precinct; that W. F. Hill is hereby appointed as Registrar, and M. C. Dehart and E. H. Berrong are hereby appointed as Judges at Liberty precinct.

It is ordered by the Board that the register books for the said election shall be opened on Saturday the 12th day of July, 1924, and each Saturday thereafter for four successive weeks at the said precincts, viz.: Shoal Creek, Vests, and Liberty, for the registration of those desiring to vote, who are not on the registration books. That the register books be closed on

Saturday the 2nd day of August, 1924.

That at the said election, those in favor of the bond issue shall vote on a written or printed paper ballot of the regulation size and form "For \$50,000 Bond Issue for Road Improvement"; those who are not in favor of the bond issuance shall vote on a written or printed ballot of the regulation size "Against \$50,000 Bond Issue for Road Improvement."

That the said election be held under the election law and laws that applies to Cherokee County, and the usual ways that elections are held. That after the election has been held the returns of the same be made to this board as provided by law in such cases. That notice of this election be posted at the court house door and that the same be published in the Cherokee Scout, a weekly newspaper with general circulation, published at Murphy, N. C., for not less than four consecutive issues before the date of said election.
