ROBBINSVILLE SCHOOL OPENED LAST MONDAY

High School Enrollment Will Entitle School to Admission to Accredited List, it is Thought

The Robbinsville school opened on Monday, August 4th, with approximately 400 students enrolled, something like 80 of which are in the high school.

With the merging of the Sweet Gum and Bear Creek schools with the Robbinsville school, seven schools are now concentrated at this one point, the others being Sweetwater, Highlands, Etowah, Long Creek and Buffalo.

The Robbinsville school is now in a position to accommodate the additional students brought in by the consolidation plan, a beautiful new building having recently been completed.

An attractive interest in athletics is expected in the Robbinsville school this year, says Mr. Justis.

The school at Robbinsville will have 11 teachers this year, four of whom will be in the high school. Following is a list of the teachers selected:

Sunday School Lesson For August 10th

GOLDEN TEXT—Whatever he saith unto you, do it.—John 2:25.

What do we pray for in the first petition?

In the first petition, which is, "Hallowed be thy name," we pray that God would enable us and others to glorify Him in all that whereby He maketh Himself known, and that He would dispose all things to His own glory.

And "the third day there was a marriage in Cana of Galilee." Why is this called the third day? What took place on the other two days? Why are the days not mentioned after this day? These questions arouse our interest and we can satisfy our craving for knowledge by referring to the first chapter of John.

In two days Jesus had won four as his genuine followers. We find that it is always fruitful to watch Jesus at work. It may prick our conscience but it is a fact that the reports of a certain denomination in our own Southland last year show that 800 well trained pastors serving more than 5,500 church members won not a single convert.

This third day was necessary in order to manifest the real character of Jesus in the presence of his disciples. They had started to follow and their feeble faith needed a clear manifestation for an invincible argument.

The mother of Jesus was present. Whether this was a relative or close friend of the family we are not told but it is quite natural to infer that his mother was there filling a real place.

In this case she quietly and unobtrusively told the trouble to Jesus. We do not understand his answer. To guess at its meaning I would say that Jesus was only pleading for the privilege of fitting into the situation unnoticed.

We close with two or three interesting facts. One is that there must have been around 120 gallons of wine and a second is that these water pots were used for cleansing.

TRUETT MEETING OPENS SUNDAY AT 11 O'CLOCK

Other Church Services Suspended—Extensive preparations Being Made to Care for Visitors

The twelve days' series of sermons to be delivered here by George W. Truett, world famous preacher, will open Sunday morning, August 10th at 11 o'clock and continue the 22nd of the month.

Everything possible has been done to take care of the crowds that his coming will attract. The town has been canvassed for rooms to supplement the hotel accommodations and arrangements have been made with the Blue Ridge Assembly of Georgia for a large number of cots and bedding, which will be shipped here and placed in vacant buildings for the accommodations of overnight visitors.

Daily letters are being received from points as far distant as Florida on the South and Illinois on the North making inquiries about the meeting, which fact leads members of the local committee on arrangements to believe that literally hundreds of visitors will be here from quite a distance, who will expect to find lodging here.

This is by far the biggest drawing event Murphy has ever had the privilege of entertaining and it is bending every effort to take care of it properly.

The preaching services at the churches have been suspended so that the entire town may have an opportunity of attending all of the Truett meetings. Sunday school, which will not conflict with the Truett preaching hours, will be continued at the churches, however.

Distillery Captured On Owl Creek

Deputy C. J. Marcus, with the assistance of W. A. Hass, specially deputized officer, on last Friday captured on Owl Creek one of the largest distilleries seen in this section in some time, and along with the distillery a young man by the name of Onard Clark, son of George Clark, who was brought to Murphy and lodged in jail on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

Along with the distillery about 4 gallons of whiskey was captured and a small jug was broken on the spot. The four gallons were brought to Murphy and held for a day, then poured out in the public square. The distillery was estimated to hold something like 100 or 125 gallons. The entire outfit was taken.

T. J. Sword Property Offered at Auction

About seventy-five lots of T. J. Sword will be offered for sale at auction on August 19th by the Oglesby Realty Company, of Atlanta, Ga. This property includes a number of beautiful residential sites, several homes and some business lots.

GRAHAM COUNTY SCHOOL NOW ON BETTER BASIS

County Superintendent J. H. Moody, of Graham County, is very optimistic about the progress being made in the educational system of the county. The superintendent accounts for this upon the facts of better roads, better school houses and school equipment, and upon the increased interest of the people in public education.

The schools in Graham County will be cut down to 21 this year as a result of the plan of consolidation that has been going on for some time. There were formerly about thirty schools in the county, more than half of which were one teacher schools. Mr. Moody believes that as a result of consolidation that the cost of the schools will be cut down. The cost, however, is not the chief factor. It is certain that much better work can be done and that the children will profit as a result of the consolidation plan and benefit to the children is the primary consideration, it is pointed out.
