NORTH CAROLINA—Cherokee County, Murphy, Jan. 7, 1925.

The Board met January 6th, 1925, T. W. Axley, chairman, W. J. Martin and W. T. Holland, members.

It appearing from the report of the registrars and judges of the election Nov. 4, 1924, at Boiling Springs, Whereas at the general election this particular boundary for stock law was voted on and it appearing that 33 votes were cast in favor of stock law and 25 against stock law, a majority in favor of stock law, this boundary hereinafter set out, viz:

Beginning on Graham County line in what is known as Snow Bird Gap, and runs a South course to East corner of Ben Deckery's land; thence with said lands an eastern course including said Deckery's land across Hangingdog Creek to top of dividing mountain between Owl Creek and Hangingdog Creek and to the said stock law line; thence with said stock law line a S. W. course with said line to what is known as the Allen Gap between Benvidam and Davis Creek section; thence with highest ground a N. E. course to what is known as the Dead Tree Gap; thence with the meanders of the dividing mountain between Telloe and Davis Creeks; thence an East course to what is known as the McDonald Ball and corner of Graham County line; thence with said line S. E. direction to Snow Bird Gap and the beginning.

Now, therefore, the above mentioned boundary is and the same is hereby declared a stock law territory and shall be from and after this date, and any person or corporation or company are forbidden to allow horse, cattle, sheep, hogs, or any other stock of any description to run at large in said boundary, from and after this date.

It is further ordered that the provisions of the law relative to stock law and jurisdiction of Chapter 36 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina shall be in effect in said boundary from and after the above date.

It is further ordered by the Board that a copy of this order be posted at the Court House and published in the Cherokee Scout.
