A GOOD BEGINNING

There are a number of essentials in the making of a permanent band organization, among which are the following:

First, good instruments. It is just as impossible for a band man to do good work with a poor, out-of-tune instrument as it is for a farmer to chop wood with a dull axe, a barber to shave you with a bad razor, or for a grocer to deliver his goods in an ice-cart.

Second, proper knowledge of music, and the instrument on which you play. No banker can be successful unless he is thoroughly familiar with business and finance. No carpenter can be an expert unless he knows how to properly use his tools. Neither can a band man attain perfection unless he is master of his instrument, and knows, thoroughly, what he is striving to attain.

Third, promptness and dignity. There can be no success for a band, don't-care person in the band, any more than in any other line of endeavor.

There are many other essentials, such as neatness, courtesy, etc., but owing to lack of space we only mention the main attributes.

The purpose of this article is to inform you that we have about twenty men, and young men, who are earnest workers and are making every effort to meet the requirements of a successful band man.

It is true that not all of the members have first class instruments. However, a few of them have, and the others are making attempts in that direction which ultimately will bring results.

The matter of maintaining the band for the first three months (through the suggestion of a number of business men) has been left up to individual subscription. Subscriptions of one dollar per month for this period are being solicited, and if you have not already subscribed you may have the privilege of doing so by seeing any member of this organization.
