Zoran Akra, a porter in Constantinople who recently celebrated his 100th birthday is known as the world's oldest man. For more than a century he has worked as a porter or "nawal" in the streets of the Turkish capital, carrying bales of merchandise from ships to warehouses.

Akra, whose great age is authenticated by a birth certificate, eats raisins, figs and all the sugar he can secure. To this diet, and the fact he has never tasted coffee or alcohol, he attributes his century and a half of life. He has had five wives and is now looking for the sixth.

The Right Pathway

That North Carolina is traveling the right pathway in developing small rather than large industrial centers is supported by the following word from Governor Smith, of New York, before the Buffalo Regional Planning Conference:

"If true wealth is to be measured in spiritual terms or in terms of happiness our great cities have not added to the wealth of many. I do not mean the increase of material wealth of the few who can afford to escape from the noise and steam of our cities from time to time. I mean the conservation and enrichment of life for the masses of the people who are being crushed by the machinery of the colossal industrial cities.

Why concentrate our population in two or three great cities when the State offers so many desirable locations for industry? The giant power of electricity, created by our own waters, offers the means of industrial decentralization.

How is the state of the future to be planned? Is it just to be an accidental growth—is it to grow in such a way as to serve the best interests of small groups, or is it to be so planned as to make the life of every man, woman and child a fuller and finer life? The planning of communities and the planning of the state is probably the greatest undertaking we have before us.—Walter J. Matherly
