A thoroughly scientific study is in progress on the oak farms at Red Wing which are now fully electrified. This study will seek to establish the real economic basis on which electric service can be given the farmer so that it will be profitable to both him and the power company which provides it.

Alabama—Ten Lines Operating The farm electrification study which is being made in Alabama is particularly extensive. The ten experimental transmission lines established to serve farmers are scattered all over the state and embrace all types of farming. Co-operation from the farmers has been readily obtained. In fact, the principal trouble has been to keep up with the farmers, who are reported to be anxious for electric service and pleased with the results.

Cotton raising, dairying, poultry raising, truck farming, general farming and small gardens are all represented in this farm electrification study. The number of farms on the different lines varies from two or three to as many as eighty in the more suburban communities.

A special investigation is going on at the Agricultural Experiment Station of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute as to the use of electricity in dishwashing, refrigeration, poultry raising, household work, drying, water-heating, haycutting, sweet potato curing, tractor work and farm shop work.
