To Have Demonstration Orchards in County

County Agent W. R. Gray has recently announced the selection of several orchards for horticultural demonstrations in different communities of the county, and that others will be selected as soon as possible, or as soon as owners can be induced to cooperate in the demonstrations.

Those selected so far are: The orchard of Mrs. I. B. Henry, located in the vicinity of Suit; The Orchard of E. E. Stiles, at Oregreeta; The orchard of D. S. Davis, on Hangingdon; and the orchard of Boone Wright, at Topton. Other orchards will be selected for demonstration purposes as soon as possible, at convenient locations in different communities, it was announced.

The most modern and up-to-date spraying and spraying apparatus and horticultural science will be used on these demonstration orchards during the year and the attention of farmers and horticulturists of the county will be called to the progress made from time to time. It is also suggested that those who are interested in horticulture watch these orchards during the year.

In connection with demonstration orchards, Mr. Gray also announced that several acres of tomatoes would be grown in the county this year as

demonstration acres for the benefit of the farmers who are interested in the coming of a tomato canning factory which it is hoped can be established in the county next year. An effort was made this spring to establish a canning factory of this nature in the county, but not enough acreage could be secured to assure its success. It is understood that the proposition will again be open for the farmers of this section next year, and it is hoped that these demonstration acres will prove to the farmers of this section that tomatoes can be grown to advantage in the county.

Mr. Gray contemplates spending several days this summer at the Madisonville, Tenn. plant operated by the same company which seeks to locate a factory here, with a view to studying the methods of growing, grading, etc., of the farmers supporting the cannery at that place. The acres for demonstration have not yet been announced but will be shortly. A number of applications for demonstrations have been received by the agent, but as yet none have been definitely selected.

Rome, Ga. Scout Car Here Saturday

A scout car of the Rome Chamber of Commerce, with five representatives of that organization, passed through Murphy last Saturday about noon on its way to Asheville. It was making an inspection trip of the roads to Asheville with the view of interesting travelers in passing by Rome in their North and South trips. It was the belief of the Rome delegation that in the future a great many more tourists will make annual pilgrimages to this Southern Appalachian section in the future than in the past, and preparations are being made to direct such travel to this section over the highways.

At that time a stop-over will be made at Murphy during the night, according to present plans.

Secretary Foster stated that the Scouting party had been royally welcomed wherever they had stopped on the way from Rome to Murphy. The roads were in much better condition than he had expected to find them, explained, and the scenery was reported as wonderful. The scouting party stopped over here for dinner here Saturday, leaving about 1:15 for Asheville, where they expected to spend Saturday night.
