Notice to Tax Payers Of Cherokee County

Tax listing time is drawing close. In fact the various tax listers for the various Townships have their notices out stating the time and places they will meet you.

We are putting this notice in for the benefit of all tax payers. The law provides that every man or woman that has personal or real estate in your list taker at one of these places that is most convenient for you, and it has been the custom and it is growing very rapidly to neglect this matter and go to Murphy to list your taxes some time later. Now the law does not make this provision but does make the provision that a man failing to list his taxes has committed a misdemeanor and is subject to indictment and being double taxed, and this year we are going to be governed by the law. To fail to list your taxes with these list takers, creates an endless trouble to some man, not just merely listing your taxes but your list must then be kept separate during the year and a tab kept of this which is no little trouble and uncalled for by the individual. It only takes one time to do this, therefore you are urged to do this and by so doing you will save extra cost to yourself.

There will be no taxes listed this year except with the list takers and that at one of these places.
