Miss Lula Fry was the guest of Miss Edna Vandiver Sunday.

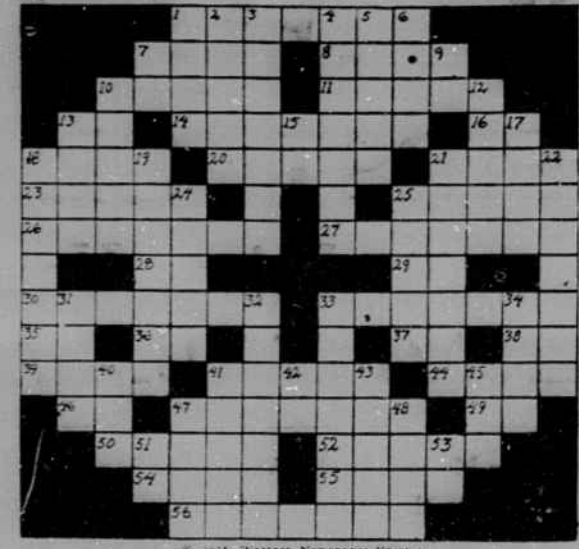
Mr. and Mrs. Frank Coleman and children were Bates Creek Visitors Sunday.

CALIFORNIA TO GIVE OTHER STATES DATA

Will Supply National Committee With Facts About Its Thirty Thousand Electrified Farms.

Definite activity is in progress in California, the one state where actual farm electrification is further advanced than in any other, to collect data which will be of benefit to other states interested in this subject. The national committee on the Relation of Electricity to Agriculture will be the clearing house for the information secured. The arrangement resulted from visits to California by Dr. E. A. White, director of the committee. He informed a gathering of California agricultural and electrical men of the national committee's purpose and assisted in the organization of a California state committee. In California, thirty thousand farms use electricity. Their consumption of energy in a typical year amounted to 564,000,000 horsepower hours. Eighty per cent of this energy was employed to operate irrigation pumps. Nearly half of all the electrical energy expended on California farms is derived from electric motors. At the same time, much use is made of electricity on California farms for typical farming operations. There are also many California farm homes which are completely electrified. Several sub-committees are gathering general information on the California farms which use electricity. One committee will gather data on costs and kinds of uses of electricity. Another will investigate the question of rates for farms. The third committee will find out how electricity is used in California farm homes and how it makes life more livable on the farm. The fourth committee will study the economic utilization of electricity on the farm. Poultry farms and dairy farms will be given special study, as all the farm shop, refrigeration, spraying of plants will also be into by one of the committees. It is to be expected that the information obtained in California.

FARM EFFICIENCY

Iowa State College President Thus Speaks of the Present Trend. Addressing a conference at Ames, Ia., called to consider what electricity can do for agriculture, President H. A. Pearson, of Iowa State College, said that agriculture is now passing through its third period of development, typified by the desire for efficiency. In the first two periods, he pointed out, direct delivery from farmer to consumer and quantity production for big crops were the characteristics, respectively. "The new era," he said, "must be one of permanent industry and characterized by business methods, low cost of production, highly intelligent methods of marketing and maintenance of soil fertility. In this period the highest efficiency will be necessary to compete with foreign agriculture." He then introduced representatives of electrical farm investigations from several states, who briefly sketched what they hope to find out regarding the contribution which electricity may make to efficiency in agriculture.

Looking forward to the electric farms will be more general in this country, the Electric Company has developed farm chore motor in four horsepower sizes. Wherever service is already available on either through power company or independent farm power

Europe Well Along In Farm Electrification

Experimental work in farm electrification has been going on in Europe for a somewhat longer period than in this country. The four European countries which, from available reports, appear to have done the most in this work are Sweden, Germany, France and Italy, in about the same named. Government financial assistance has been given to some extent. In Sweden about one-third of farms are electrified thus far, as to the abundant hydro-electric sources, and even threshing and plowing are done electrically. Experiments in France and Germany since as long ago as 1908.

Lights and Pumps Are Greatest Desires

So far as the woman on the farm concerned, there has always been glowing possibility of giving it a happier aspect through the coming of electricity. It has been asserted sixty-six out of every one hundred women on the farms of the U. S. handle a big wash on Monday. That points unmistakably to the ties which the average farm woman would like to see electricity take away of all.
