Wisdom Of Farm Aid Is Recognized By Investors Who Have Advanced Millions To Soil Tillers Of Nation

The wisdom of affording every financial aid within reason to farmers and farming communities has been repeatedly emphasized by Edward D. Duffield, president of the Prudential Insurance Company, particularly in a recent address dealing with farm mortgage loans as investments for life insurance funds made before the Domic Club of New Jersey.
Life insurance companies have more than doubled the amount of their loans on farms in this country during the last five years in addition to responding to housing needs in congested urban communities. In the last five years the Prudential lent \$265,689,138.20 on farm mortgages. During 1924 a smaller amount of Prudential farm loans indicated a progress towards prosperity in agricultural districts.
Referring particularly to farm loans, Mr. Duffield said: "Then, too, another form of investment in this question of farm loans. Of course, it is useless to adopt any of these other methods of aiding the farmer if you are not going to aid the man who produces that which we eat, upon whom we are absolutely dependent, and so these companies are largely in the field of investment in farm loans, aiding the farmer to harvest and develop his crop, enabling him to bring in land for development purposes which otherwise he might not have been able to do, aiding him in so conducting in a scientific way these farm operations that as a result thereof the food of everyone in the United States has been made cheaper and easier to obtain than it otherwise would have been."
In 1924 the Prudential loaned \$27,267,492.97 on farm properties in the United States. They have also relieved the housing situation by extensive loans on small dwellings.
