Madisonville, Tenn. July 11, 1925. Editor Cherokee Scout:

Will you allow me space in your paper to write of a recent automobile trip which I made, together with my family, and Mr. O. O. Sloan and children. Among the many trips that I have taken since coming to East Tennessee, this particular trip was perhaps the most interesting one.

We left Madisonville, driving northeast by way of Sweetwater, crossing the Holstein River at Penhook Ferry. It is said that the river is eighty feet deep at this point. From penhook Ferry we continued to hold a northwest course to Spring City, on the Cincinnati Southern road, to the brink of the Cumberland Mountain and thence down the mountain direct south over the Dixie Highway. We stopped at a large strawberry farm and enjoyed a feast of strawberries, after which we continued on a southwestern course to Dayton, which is a mighty fine town and known now as the monkey town, where we spent about two hours and fifteen minutes. We left Dayton and continued northeast, crossing the Holstein River again. We were told that the river at this point was 200 feet deep, which is about twenty five miles below where we first crossed it. After traveling some distance we entered the county seat town in Meigs County, where they were selling strawberries from the strawberries were bringing as high as \$3.07 a crate of twenty four quarts. This county is the only county in East Tennessee that hasn't a foot of railroad in it but we found an elegant courthouse and a lively little town. After spending an hour or more there, we continued our journey by way of Athens, Englewood, and thence home, having been in five counties and four county seat towns. We enjoyed the beautiful Dixie High-

way, the crossing of one of the largest rivers in East Tennessee and the beautiful scenery of the Cumberland Mountains. It was a most enjoyable trip, the distance being quite a bit over a hundred miles, made with not even a car puncture or the slightest mishap. Thanking you, I remain Yours truly B. M. ABERNATHY
