business that they appeared to the people of Murphy to open their homes to the point of personal sacrifice, to the end that the visitors might be taken care of for the night.

Nothing in the way of amusement for the visitors on the night of their stay here, other than a public speaking feast, at which prominent officials and figures of both states will exchange felicitations, has been formally announced. However, it is expected that some of the more prominent old time fiddlers, an Indian Choir, a band concert, and like forms of amusements will be on the program to delight the visitors.

Among the prominent North Carolina visitors and officials expected here on the occasion are Governor McLean, Commissioner, Stickleather, Wyrne M. Peyton, engineer who laid out the North Carolina link of this great highway Mayor Cathey, of Asheville, and other high officials. It is urged that all citizens of any degree of influence whatsoever write to the prominent officials, both state and road, and invite and urge them to be present at Murphy on the afternoon of Sept. 14th, to the end that a like occurrence of the Fourth, when the Governor, members of the Legislature, and other prominent Georgians were honor guests of Murphy and no state or highway officials here to greet them. The committee believes that this courtesy will be expected by the Georgians, and should at least be extended on this occasion. At least time for representation by proxy if not in person.

Plans of the local committee are formulating fast, and it is expected that formal program for the night of the motorcade in Murphy will be announced soon. The committee is composed of Mayor W. M.
