NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS FOR BIDS

NORTH CAROLINA, CHEROKEE COUNTY.

Bids will be received by T. W. Axley, Chairman County Board of Commissioners of Cherokee County, Murphy, North Carolina, until Thursday, April 15th, 1926 at 12 o'clock noon for the erection of a court house for the said county, to be two stories in height, to contain offices for all necessary county officials, court room, etc. To be built of brick, marble, stone, hollow tile, the floors, ceiling and roof, slabs, etc. to be of reinforced concrete, dome and lantern to be of steel construction. Building will be heated from the present jail building by low pressure steam heat. The construction of said building is to begin within thirty days after awarding the contract and to be completed by December 1st, 1926.

Payments for work and material to be made from time to time on estimates furnished from the contractor and approved by the architect, averaging 85 per cent of the work done and material on the ground. Balance of 15 per cent to be paid when the building is fully complete and accepted by the architect and Board of County Commissioners.

Each bidder to deposit with his bid a certified check for \$1,000.00 payable to T. W. Axley, Chairman of County Commissioners or his successors, as a guarantee that he will enter into a contract with the County upon the term of his bid within ten days after the acceptance of his bid and give a bond in some surety company for faithful performance of his contract, bond to be in the sum of the full amount of the contract price and that upon his failure to enter such a contract and give bond said check is to be retained by Cherokee County as liquidated damages.

Plans and specifications may be procured by contractors wishing to bid on the same on deposit of \$25.00 with the Chairman of County Board of Commissioners or with the architect, Jas. J. Baldwin, 205 Taylor bldg., Asheville, N. C., as a guarantee that he will submit a bid on the date given and return the plans and specifications with his bid.

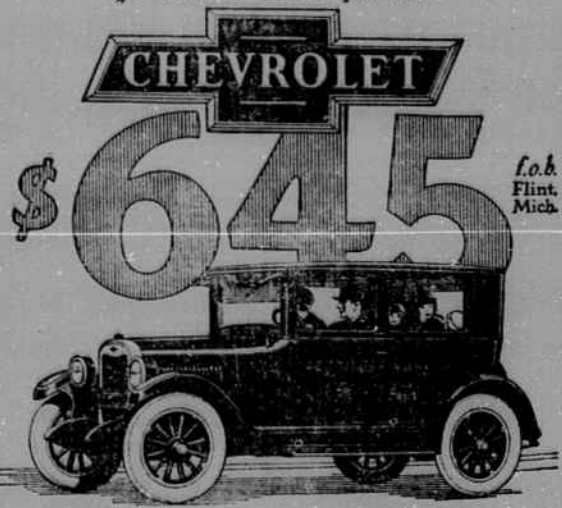
