#### BOB REYNOLDS A WINNER IN HIS CAMPAIGN FOR UNITED STATES SENATE

to active rather than merely passive  
favor.

Bob Reynolds is no novice in politics. On the contrary, he has been a notably successful career. A man around 40 or 42 years of age he has been elected and has served efficiently as solicitor of his judicial district. Two years ago he made a whirlwind canvass for the nomination for lieutenant governor and in the primary he ran a good second or run-off primary. Magnanimously he withdrew and permitted the nomination of the leading aspirant in the triangular contest. That action was characteristic of the man, and, instead of inviting criticism, it won him thousands of new friends. His philosophy of cheerful acceptance of results in everything proclaims him a good sportsman and invariably wins new friends for him. This is illustrated by the fact that many who were for his opponents in the lieutenant-governorship primary are now his active and loyal supporters and well wishers.

The campaign being conducted by the Asheville man is unique. He has no headquarters, unless it be in the tonneau of the car in which he is traveling throughout the State, or-

ganizing his supporters and meeting and winning new friends by the sheer magnetism and comradeship of the man. His contestant, Mr. Overman, has employed a campaign manager and has opened headquarters at Raleigh and Salisbury. Mr. Reynolds is his own manager, and his friends assert that he is a successful one. In fact, many well informed men and experienced political observers are predicting victory for him.

Mr. Reynolds' canvass is a man to man affair. Thoroughly democratic in manners and with a winning cordiality which is thoroughly natural to him, he approaches and greets every man he meets and, introducing himself frankly avows his candidacy and asks for support. No formality about it, no oppressive dignity assumed, just a direct, frank, man-to-man appeal. If he fails to land the vote of a man canvassed he bids him goodbye just as cordially and cheerfully and continues on his way. In the cities and towns through which he passes, every policeman, every fireman and any bystanders soon know him.

When he meets or overtakes and passes another car on the road anywhere, he leans out of his car and hands each one a card reading about like this:

"Please excuse me for passing you because I'm in a big hurry. Am trying to visit every county in North Carolina before June 5th, 1926, the date of the Democratic primary. Am a candidate for United States Senator. Will appreciate it if you will vote for me and speak to your friends about my candidacy. Good luck! Good-bye!—Bob Reynolds."

And in a moment he has gone leaving a good impression by his cordiality, his winning smile and the breeziness and hustle of the man. While he doesn't live in a house by the side of the road (but most of the time in his motor-car as he pursues

energetically his purpose to visit every county in the State), he proves himself "a friend to man." His helpfulness, his kindness, match his energy.

Boy Reynolds isn't running against anybody. He's running for Paul Reynolds and for the United States Senate. Which means that he is not knocking anybody, nor obstructively boosting himself. He tells every man he meets who he is and what he is trying to do and asks support in his endeavor. Just as simple as eating or walking or breathing. That automobile if it is reeling off the miles too. In this way he is literally making his canvass a man to man affair. An outstanding quality of the man, whether a candidate or merely a fellow man, is his uniform courtesy to all.

The vote accorded Mr. Reynolds two years ago when he did not complete his canvass of the State and his reception in the seventy-five or eighty counties through which he has passed, impress many besides Mr. Reynolds himself that he is going to win. Wherever he goes, in every county, he leaves a little group of well known men and women who become active disseminating the appeal of Reynolds for votes. His canvass is certainly unique and many unhesitatingly predict that his candidacy for the Senate will be successful. Single handed, but open-handed, he is making his fight, fairly and frankly and with marked effect wherever he goes.

It is for these reasons that many men experienced as political observers and familiar with conditions unhesitatingly predict Bob Reynolds' nomination for the United States Senate. His appeal of strongest to the average man, "the man in the street," as the phrase goes. It is to the masses rather than these classes and involve no promises. Men who know him trust him; hence the growth by leaps and bounds of the Reynolds following. — Greensboro News.

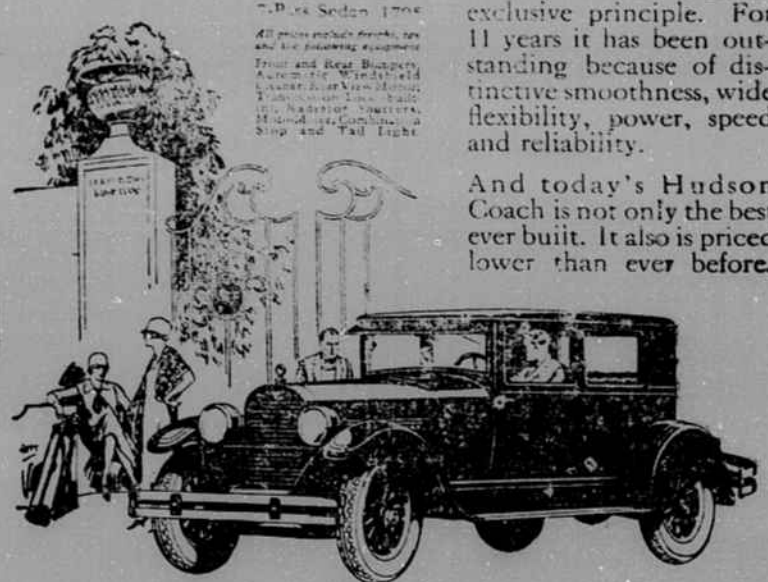

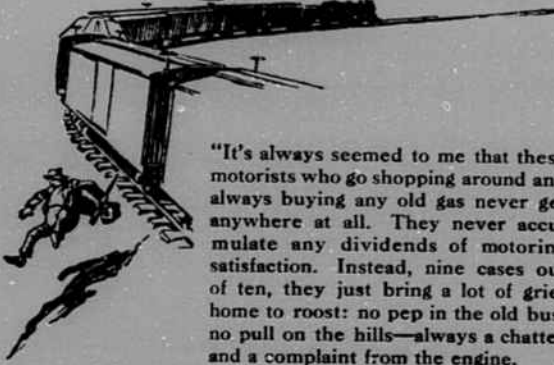
