TEN WINNERS IN AUTO RACE ON FIRESTONE

Sixth Time Gum-Dipped Tires Led in Indianapolis Speedway Contest

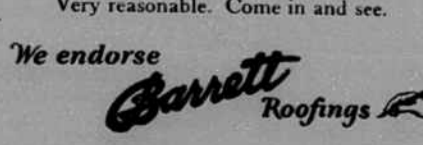
