Mrs. Garrison Maneval and Miss Elizabeth Ford, of Asheville will spend the ensuing week in town with relatives.

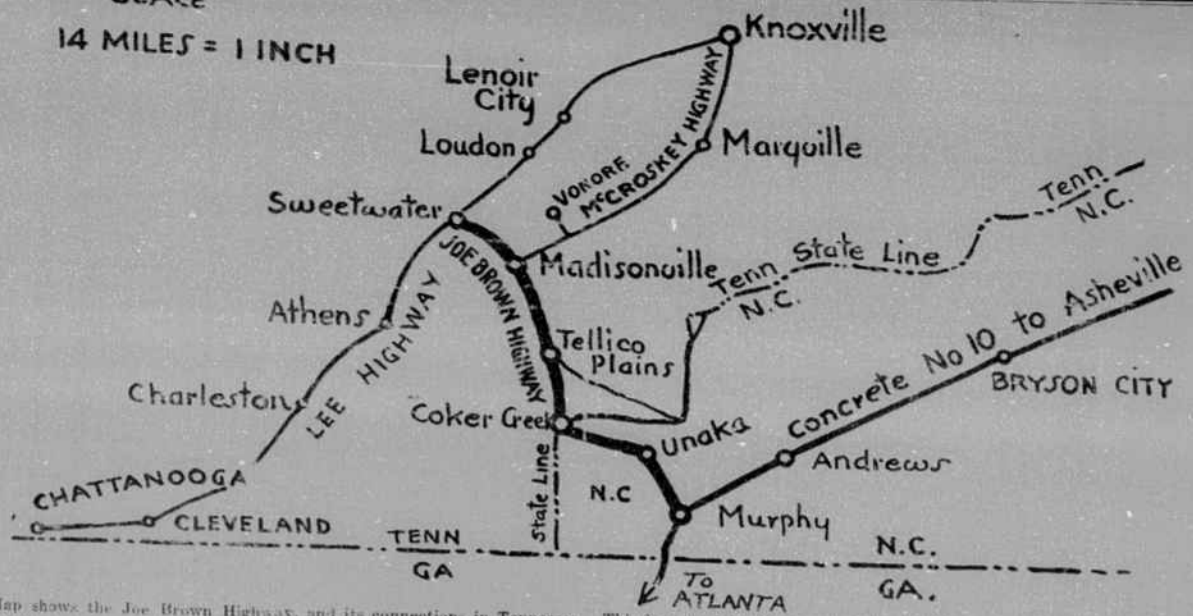
After a visit with their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Mauney and other relatives, Master John and Jean Pope have returned to their home in Knoxville.
